#### THE HEART OF TODAY'S SCHOOL





Dorothy Hartman was a small blonde girl who had a lovable personality. Her sparkling blue eyes danced when she thought something was funny. The first thing one noticed when he met her was her smile. Her favorite pastime was walking about the country. She loved especially that part of the year when the trees are beginning to blossom. Her main ambition was to become a nurse. As it often happens, those who want to bring happiness into life are often the first to leave. She became ill, and on the twenty-fourth day of February, 1944, our classmate passed away. We all felt sorry that she left us and feel that her going was not only a loss to our class but the whole community as well.

Another member of the class of '46 who left us was Jack Ross. Jack was well liked by all the members of the class and got along well with the teachers. He was tall and had curly blond hair and blue eyes. He was a quiet person and kept his thoughts to himself. His favorite pastimes were listening to the radio and reading good books. He had leadership ability, and he was elected Patrolman for his junior year. This office he was never to hold. That summer on the twenty-sixth day of June, 1944, he fell from the back of a moving van and was killed. The school and his class regret that he never got a chance to prove his worth to the community.




The team was fairly well balanced and copped many a game with their good team work and spirit.


