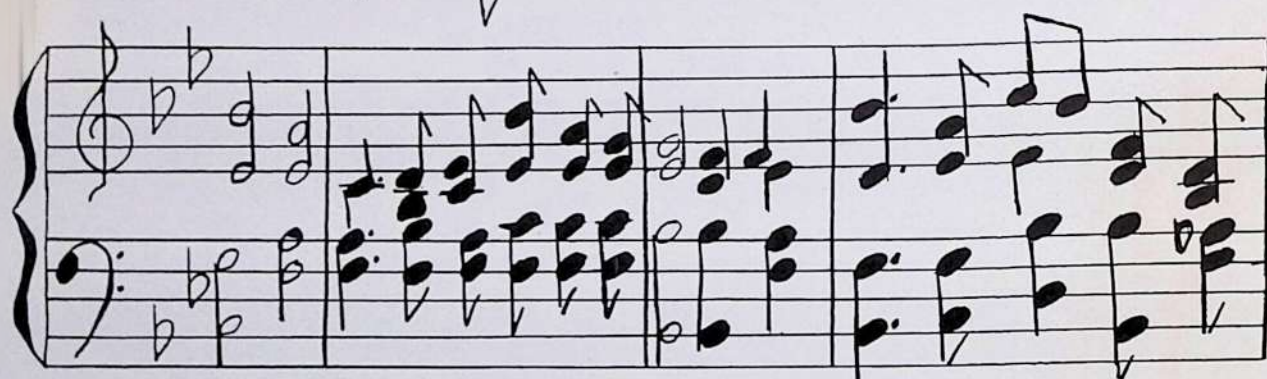
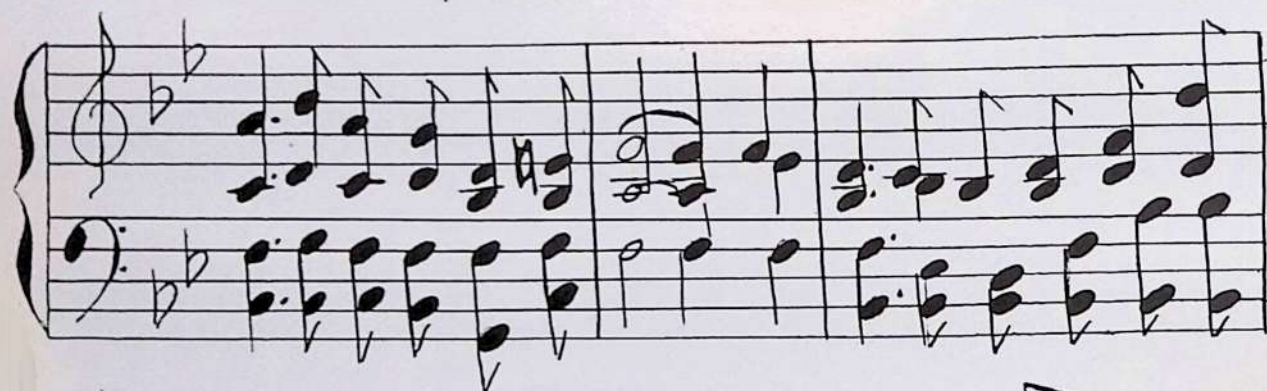

TO THE STUDENTS OF F. A. H. S.

Many of you would suppose that, as your high school principal, my major concern would be to make certain that you, the students of our school, are learning. If so, you are mistaken. Fortunately, all of you will learn without our efforts.

Thus I concern myself with only three matters: What are you learning? How efficiently are you learning? What are you going to do with what you are learning?

The material you are learning is regulated by the establishment of subject requirements, by a careful selection of text books and by the development of good courses of study; the learning process is accelerated by the control of your school environment and by the employment of competent teachers. But has it ever occurred to you that the time and money invested in your education will have been wasted unless you apply your knowledge to a worth-while purpose? To insure that you will do so is most crucial and, at the same time, most difficult.

Knowledge is power. It may become the power to do good or the power to do evil. It may be used to create or it may be used to destroy. It may alleviate human suffering or it may cause untold misery. It may be the power of Washington or it may be the power of a Hitler.

BOARD OF EDUCATION

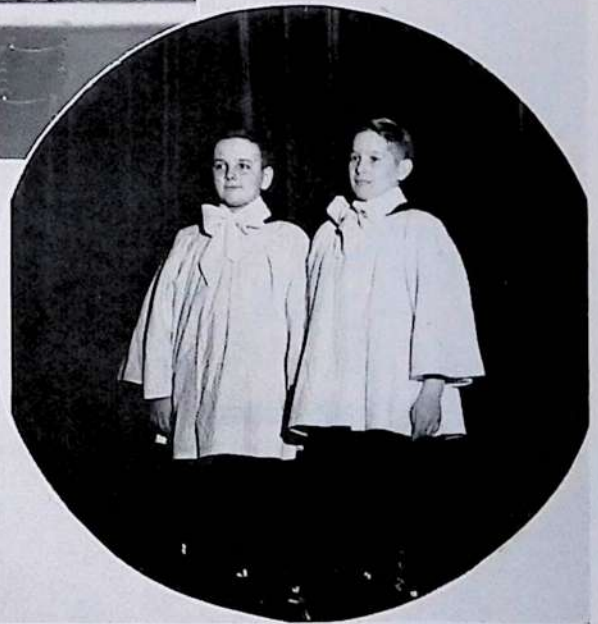
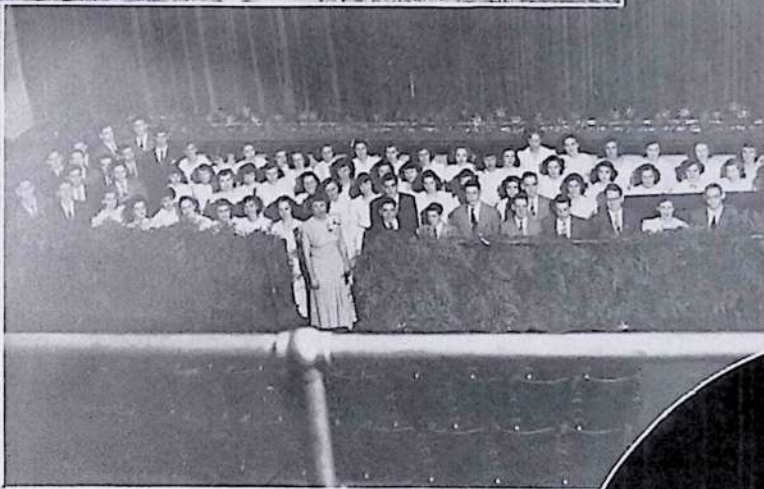
This year brought about the formation of a new school district. This district is composed of members of Freeport Borough, South Buffalo Township, and Buffalo Township. These three groups combined their efforts to give better educational facilities. The new joint district goes under the name of Freeport Area Joint Schools.

The Freeport Area Joint School Board of Education is made up of five civic-minded individuals from each of the above districts, who are elected by the people, and give of their time and effort, in order that we, the students of this school, may better prepare ourselves to take our place in society.

It must be remembered that a school board member receives no compensation for his services, other than that feeling of satisfaction that comes with a job well done.

At the organization meeting, officers elected to serve for the school term 1948-49. Mr. D. E. Taylor, the president, is from Freeport Borough. Mr. Glenn Hill, the vice-president, and Mr. Herbert Mast, the treasurer, are from South Buffalo Township. Mrs. Margaret G. Gosser was elected secretary of the board.

The outstanding project of this newly formed organization has been the completion of plans and the beginning of construction of a new annex to the present Freeport school building. When this addition has been completed, sufficient facilities will be available to provide not only for senior high school students but for junior high school students also. The board plans to have this addition completed by the 1949-50 term.

HIT THE NOTES!!

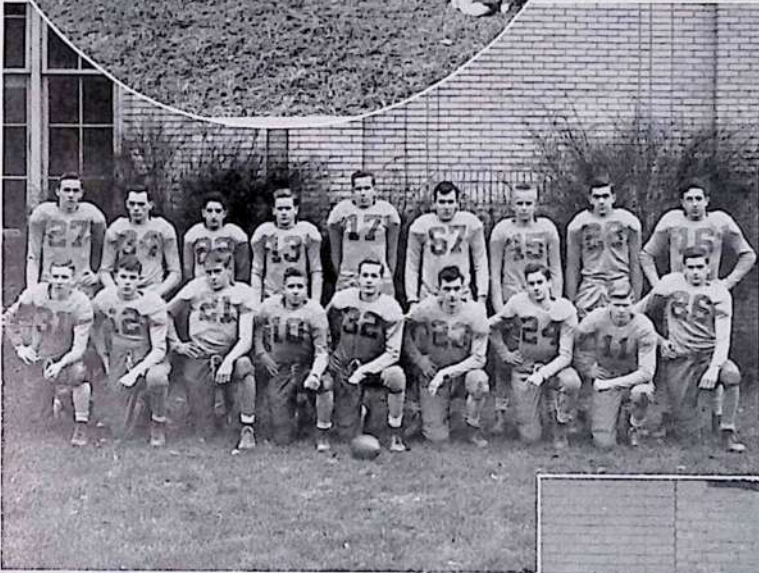
Under the direction of Mrs. Shaffer, the mixed chorus, having about 90 members, is heard daily, every seventh and eighth period.

The chorus started this year by giving a radio program known as the "Teen Ager's Time", over station WAVL.

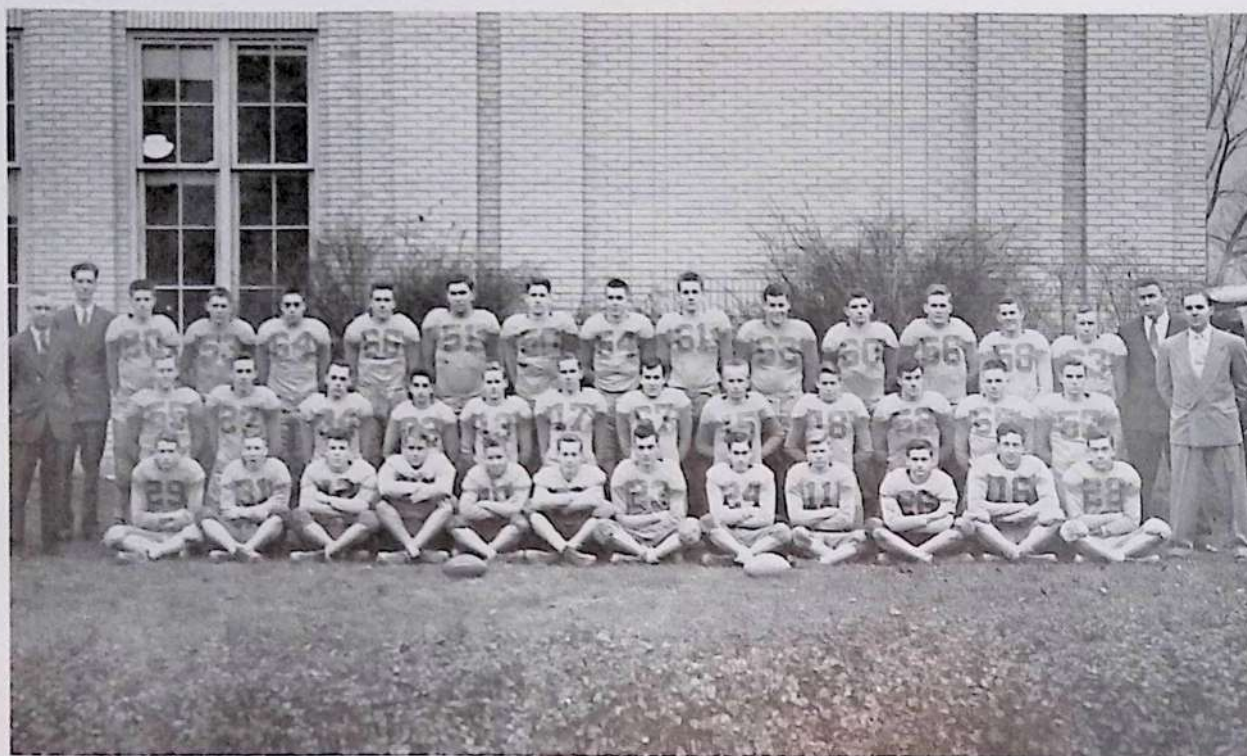

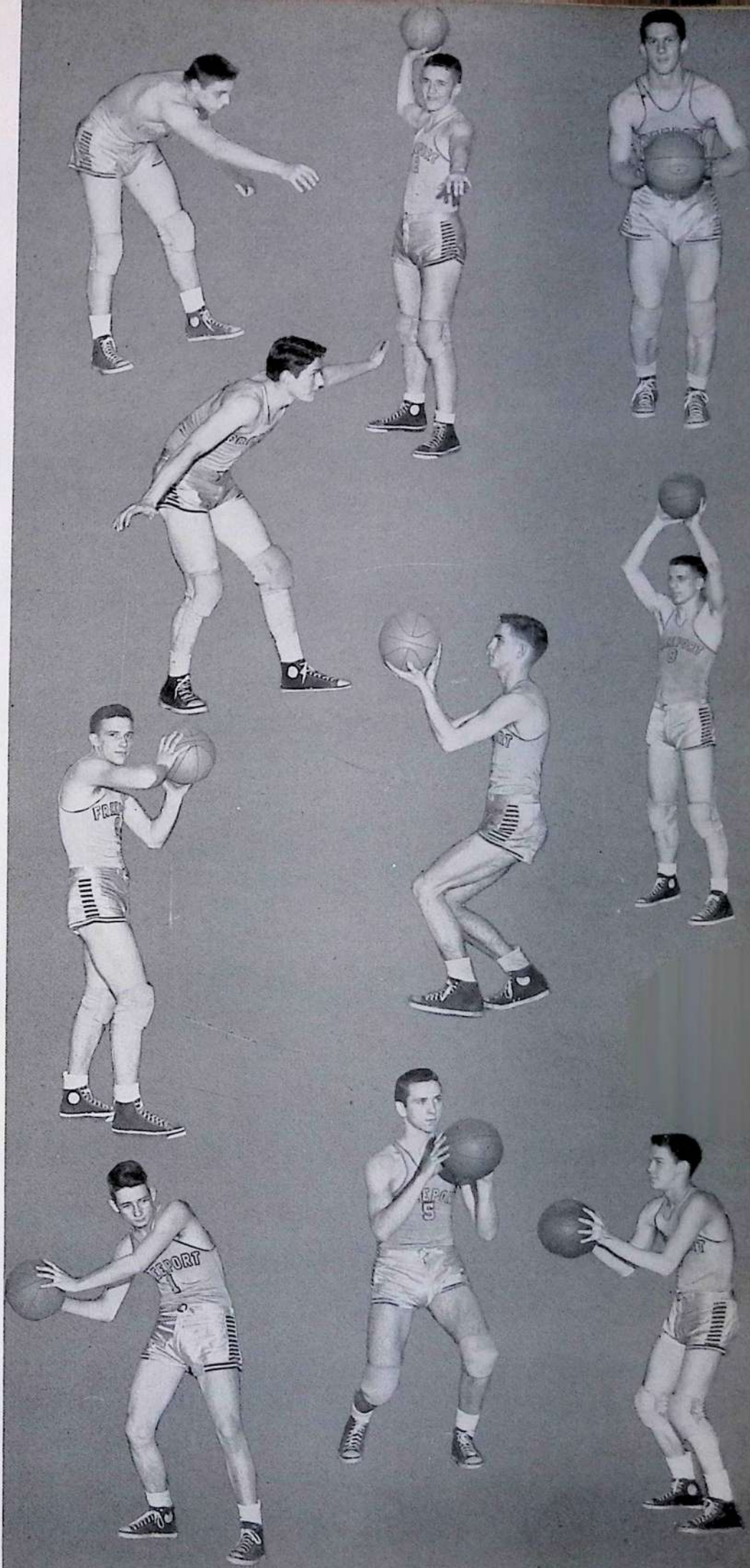

GOVERNMENT

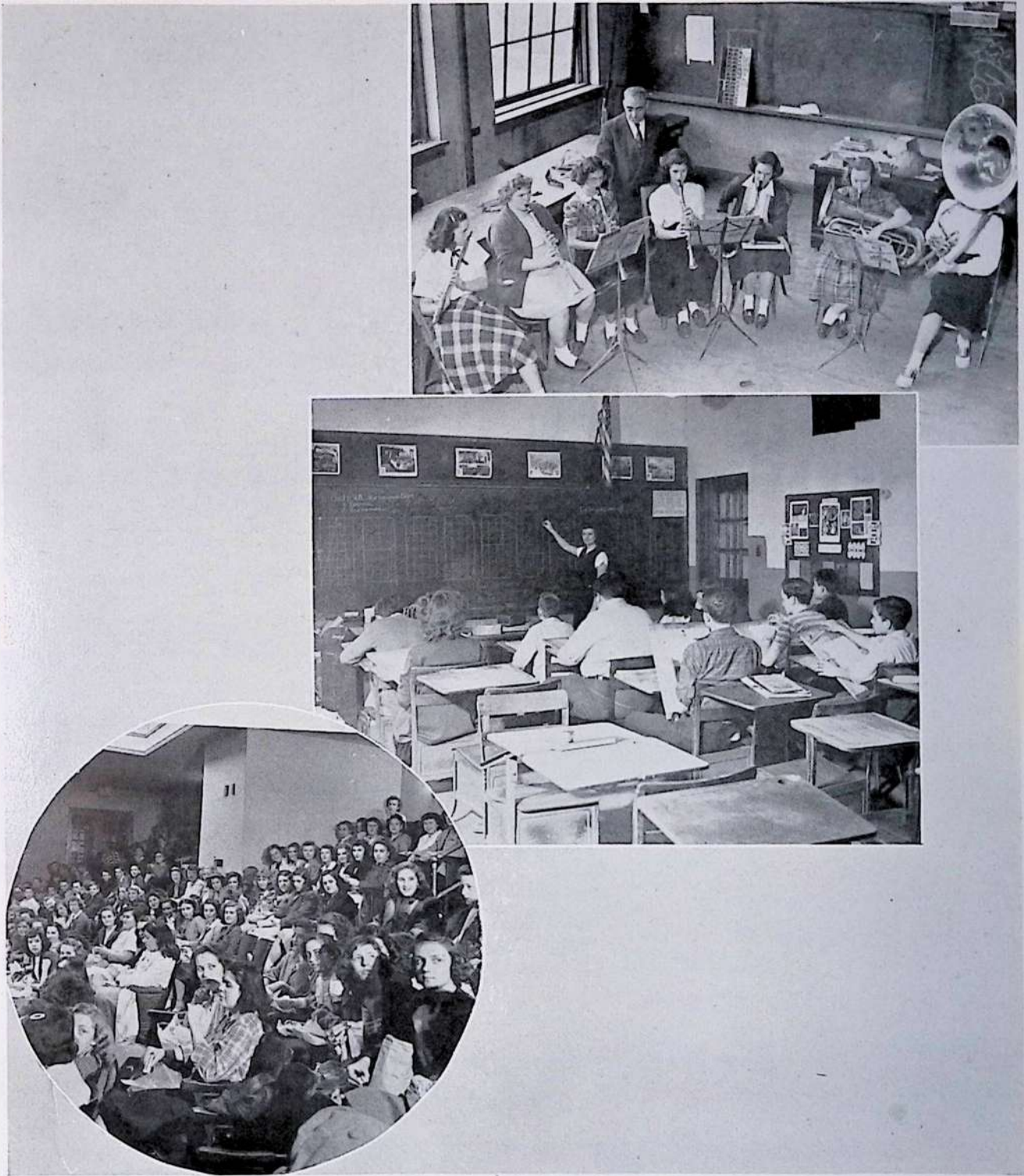
The Student Council includes the elected officers, the patrolmen, and two representatives from each home room. Its job is to provide student activities such as dances and assemblies.

This year the student council sponsored a Sadie Hawkins week, held in November and patterned after the L'il Abner comic strip.

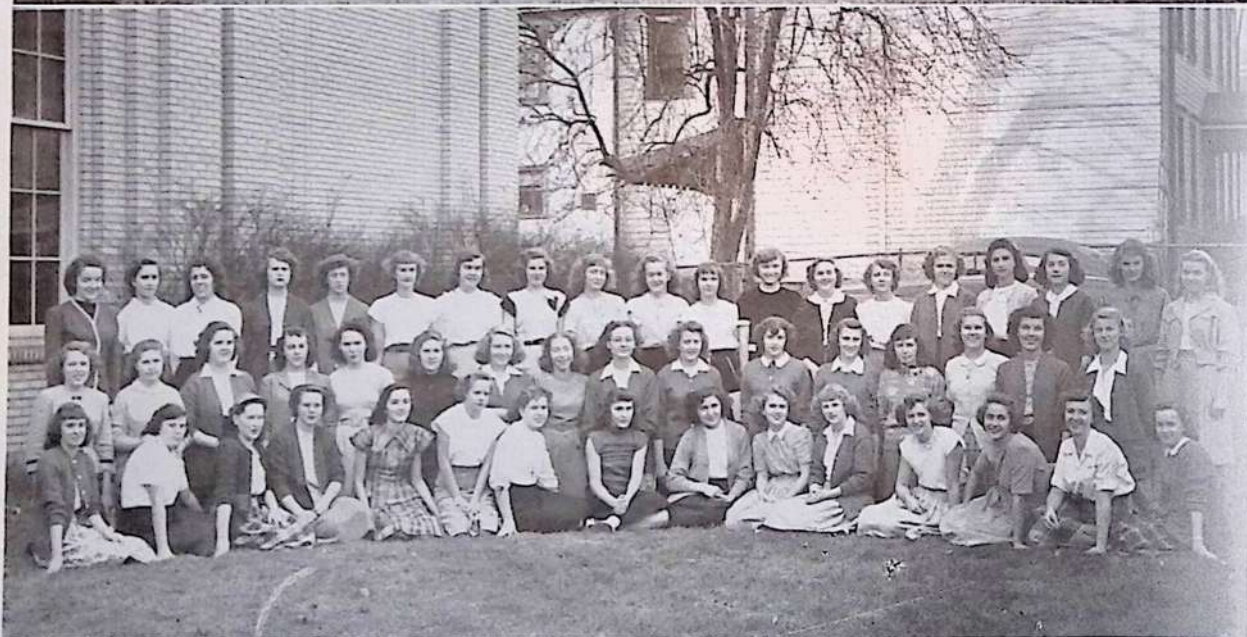
