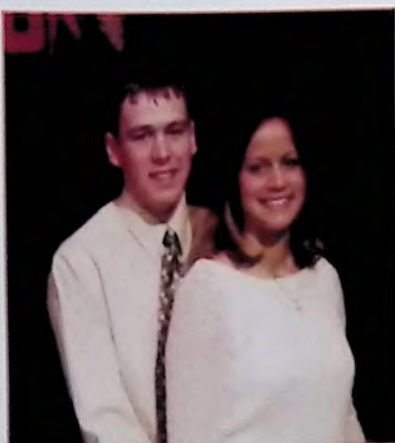

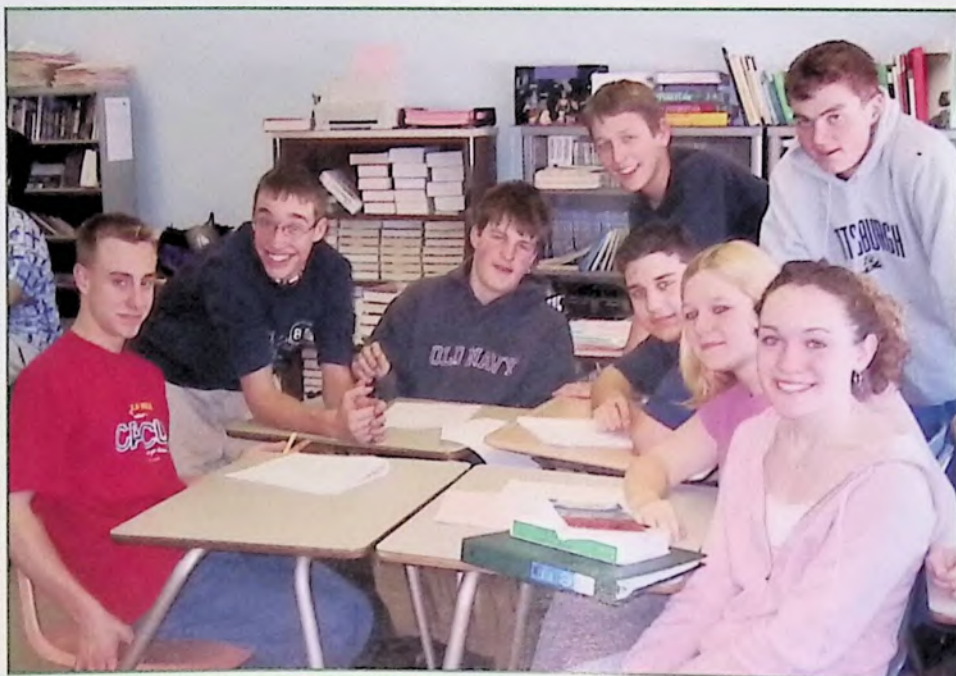

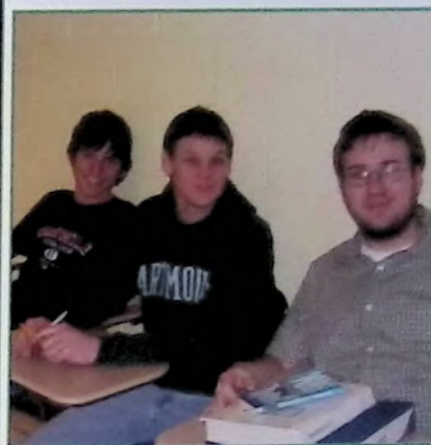

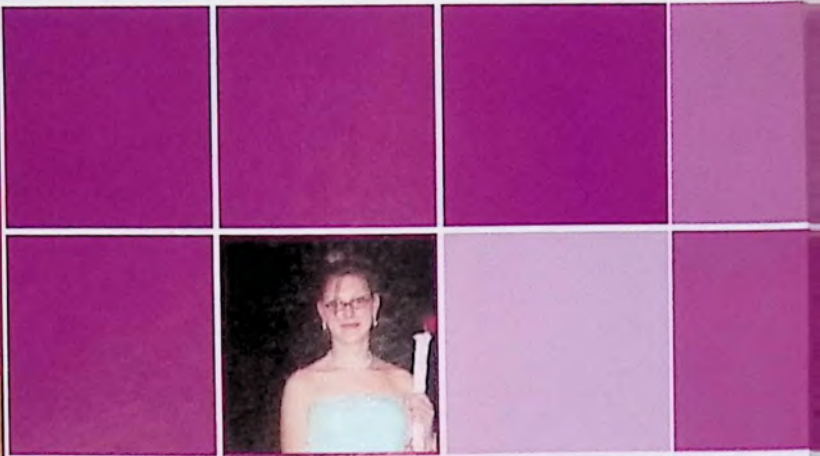

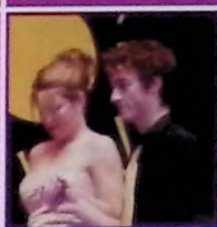

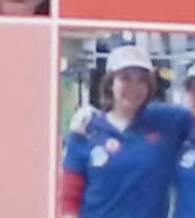

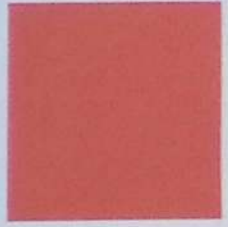

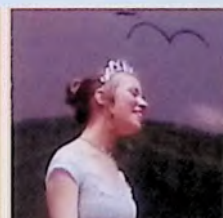

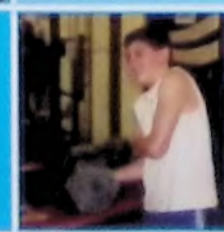
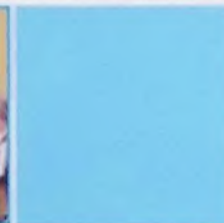

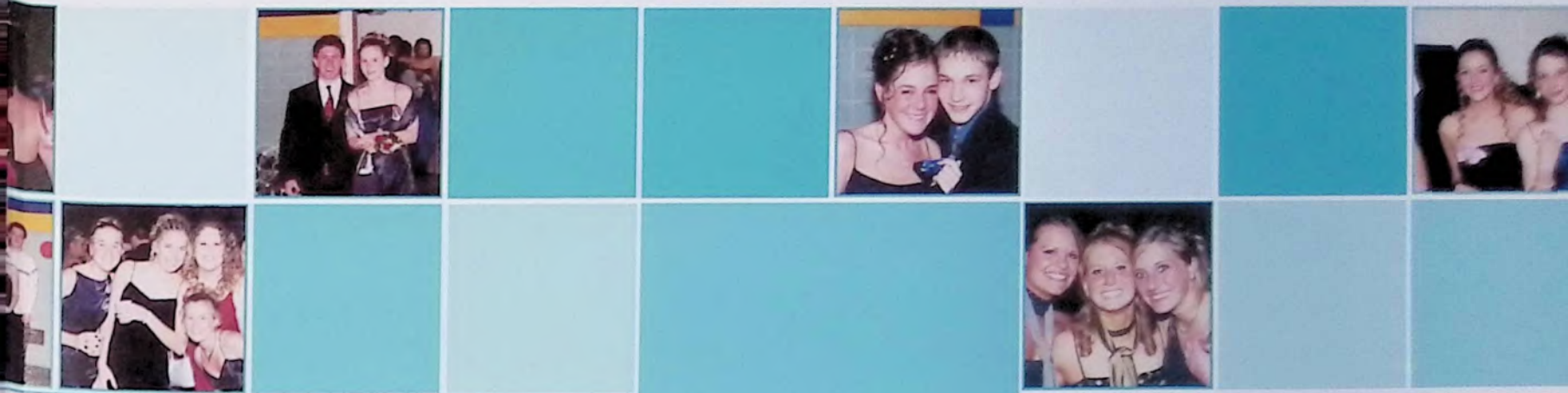

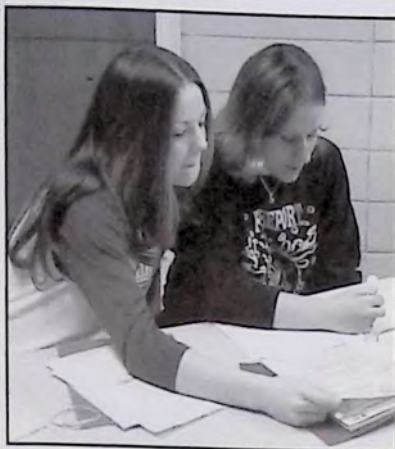

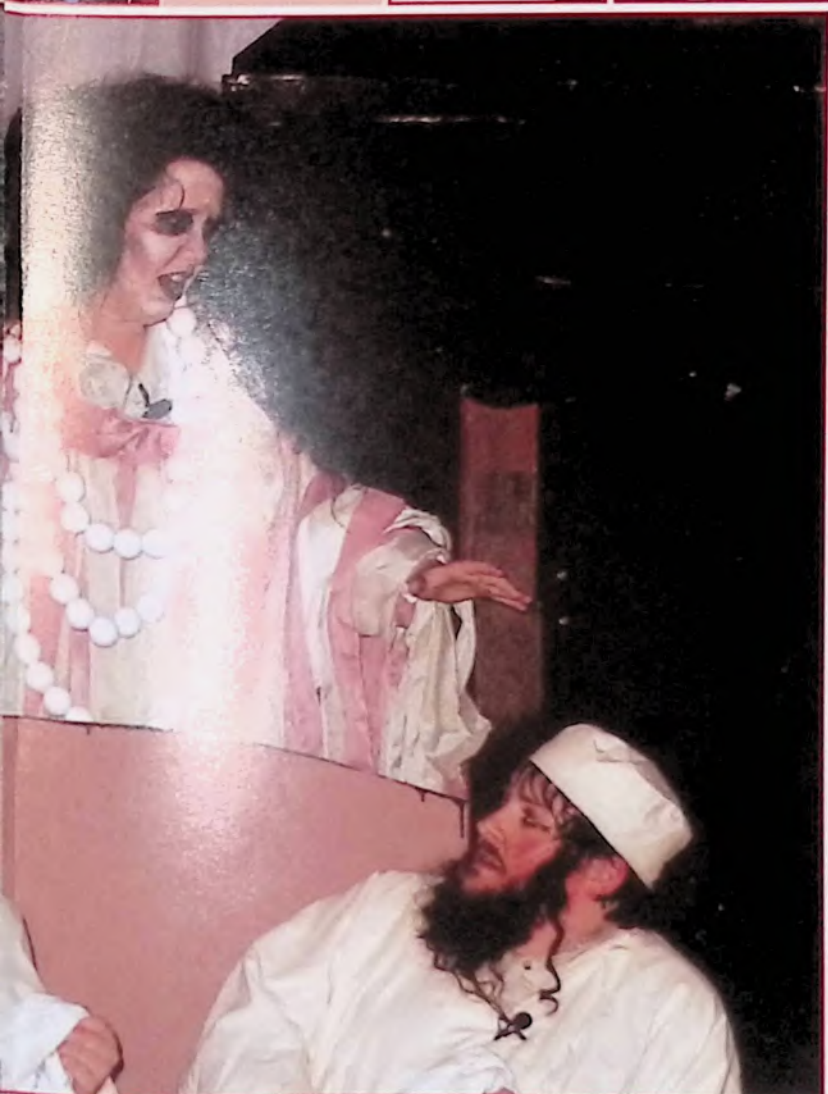

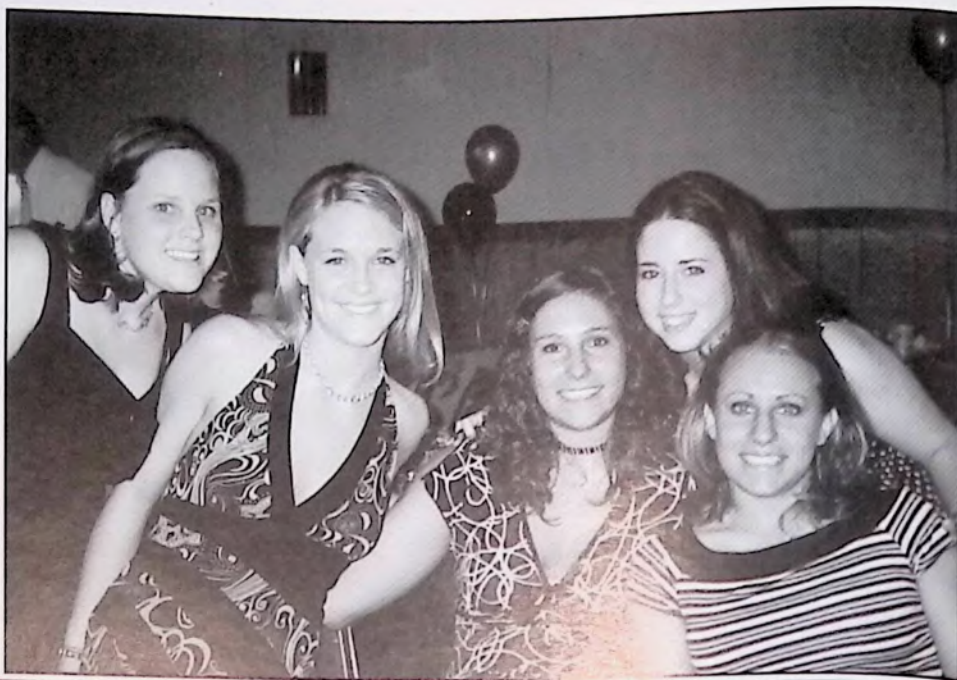

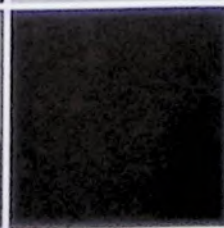

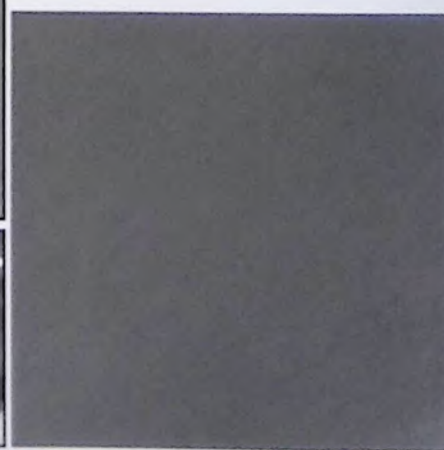
S ENIOR BANQUET

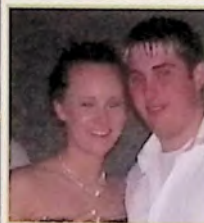

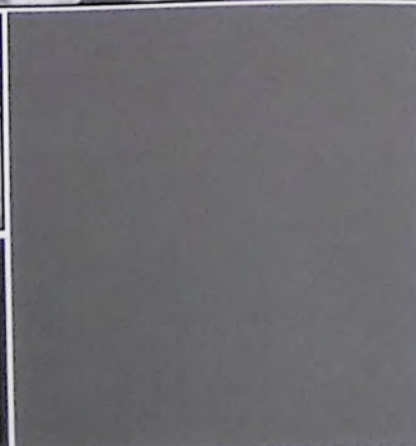

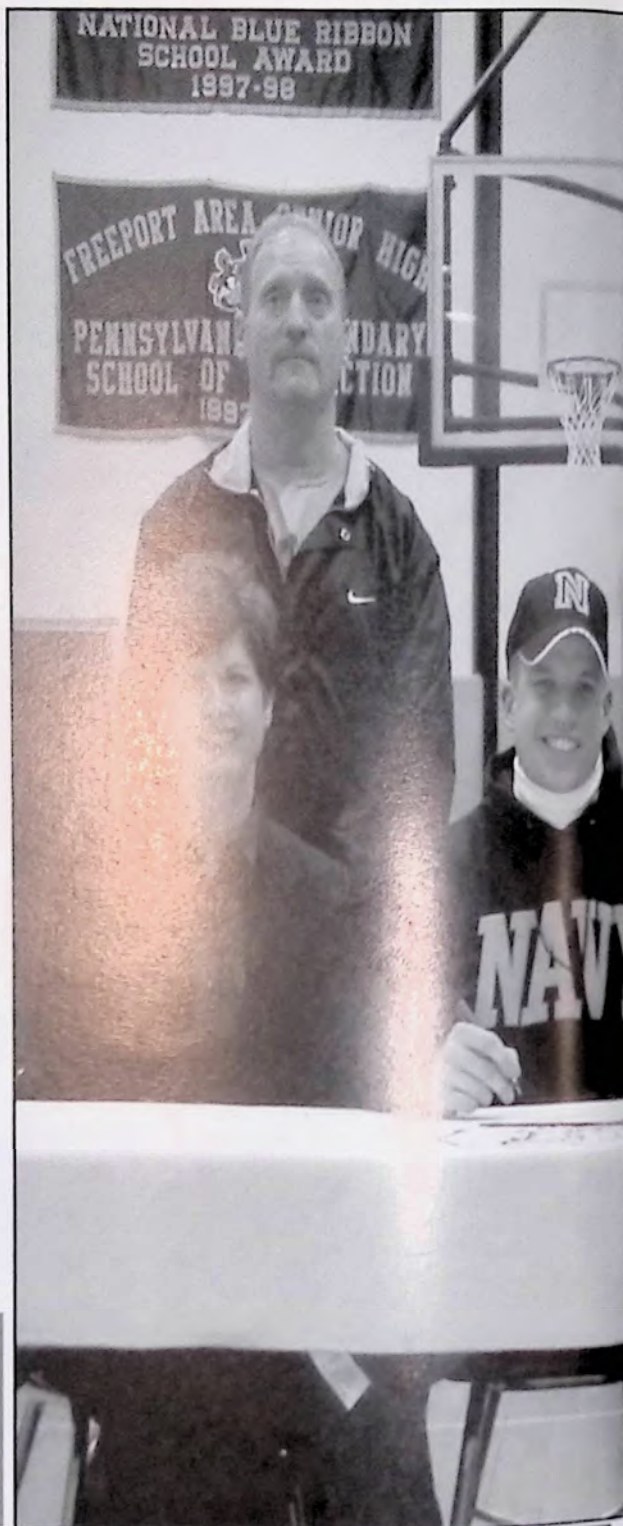

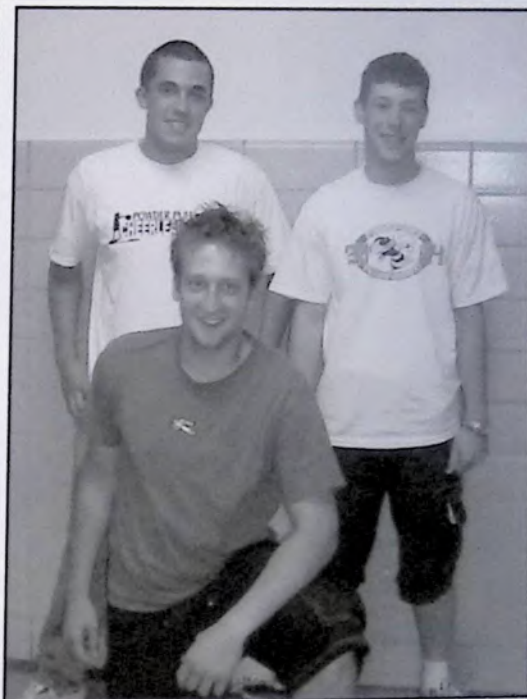

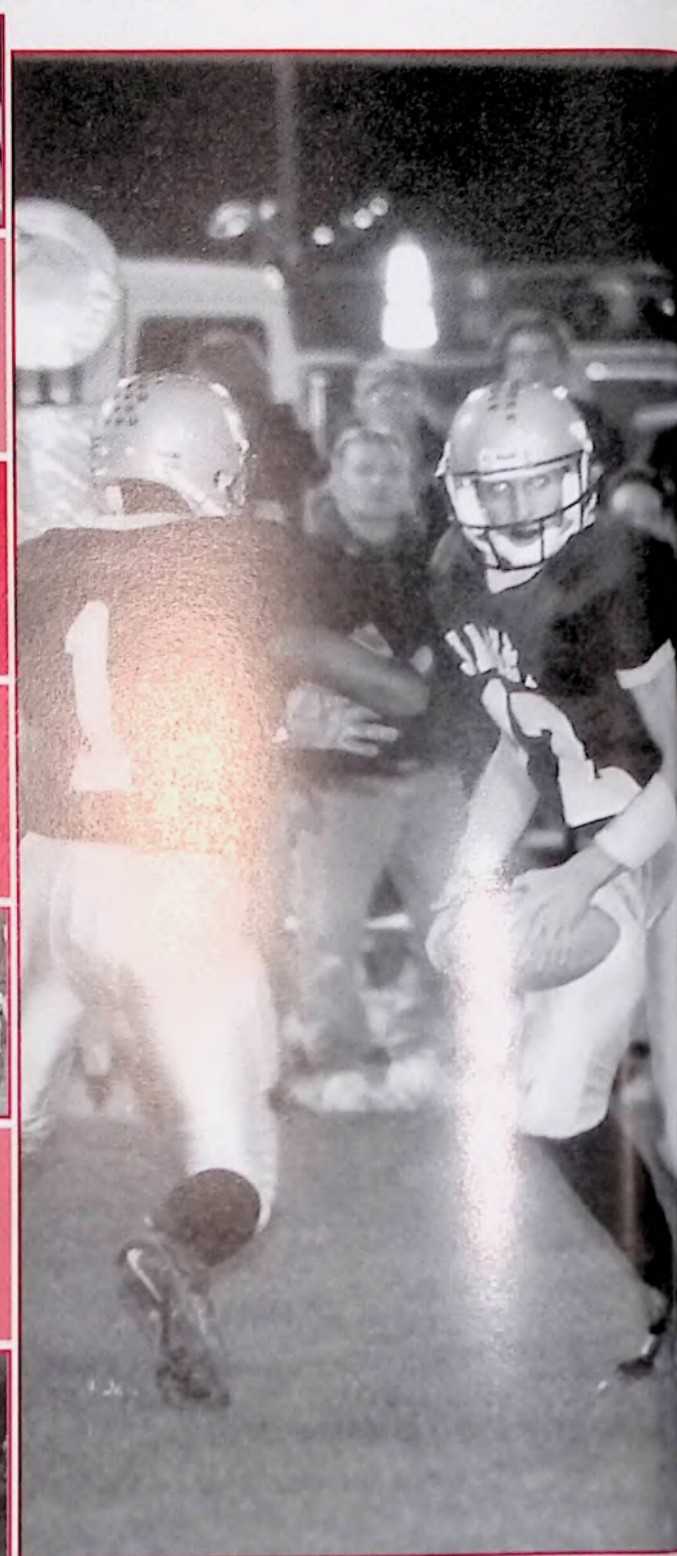


Workin'up A SWEAT

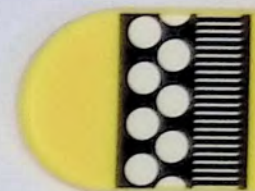

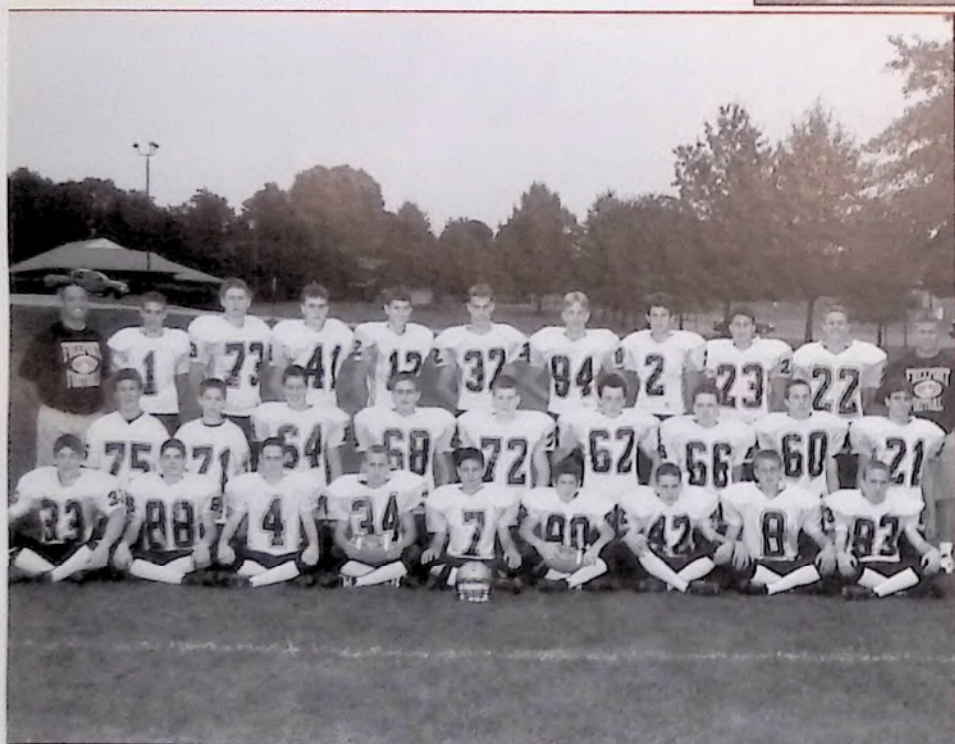

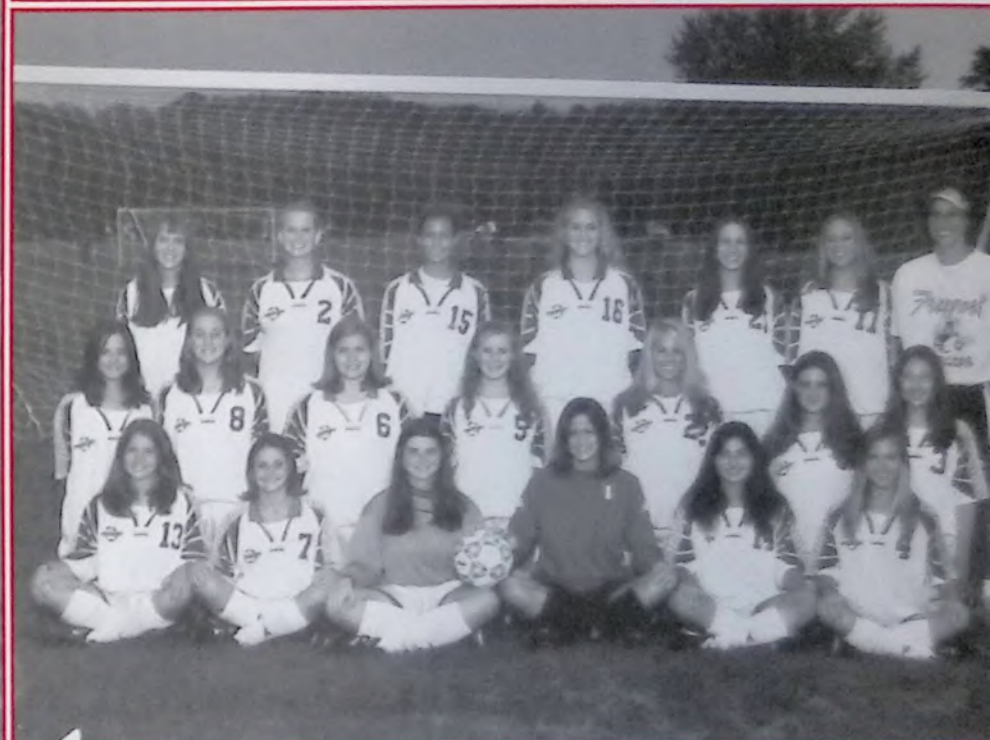

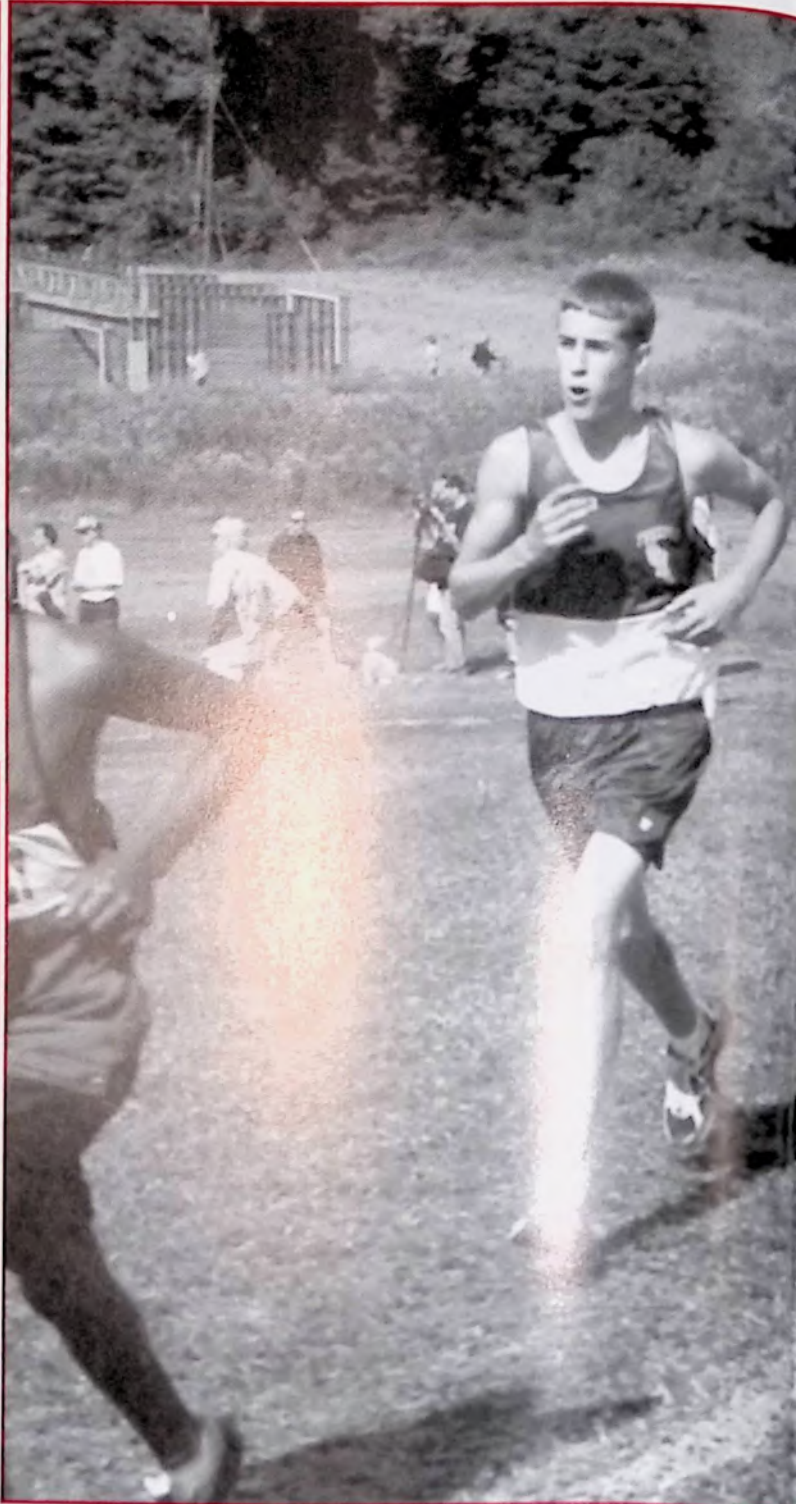

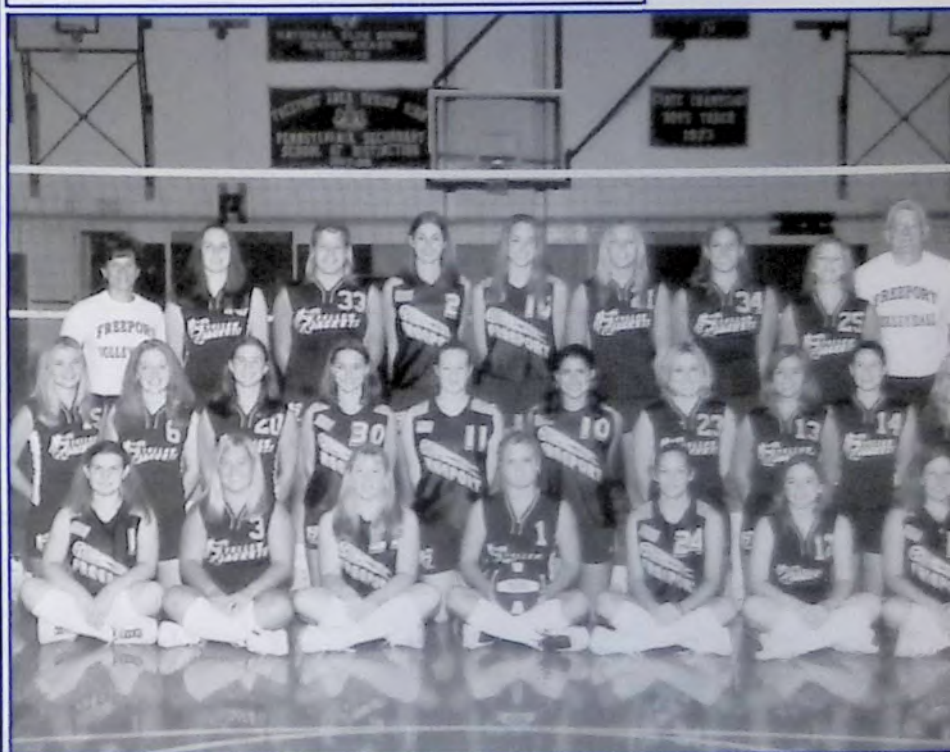

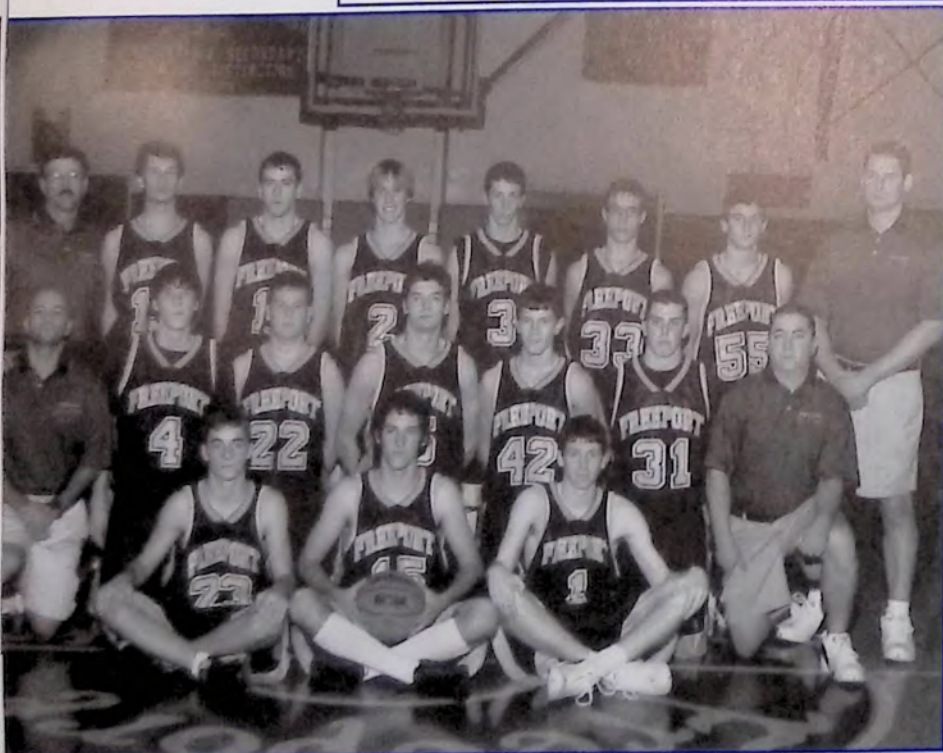

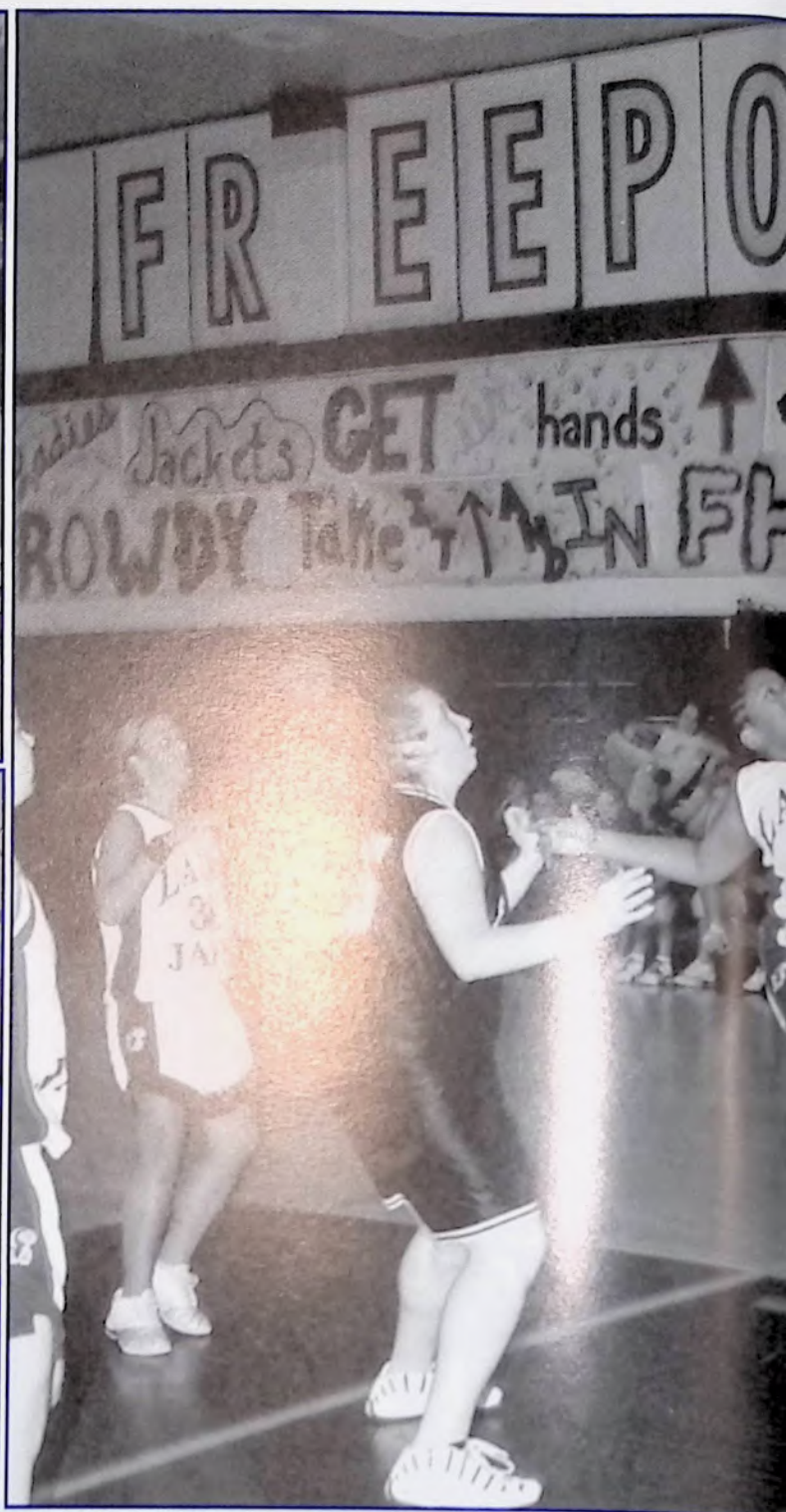
Fighting To *THE FRONT*

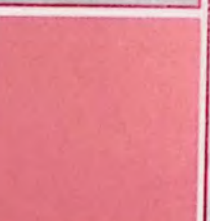
THE ICE

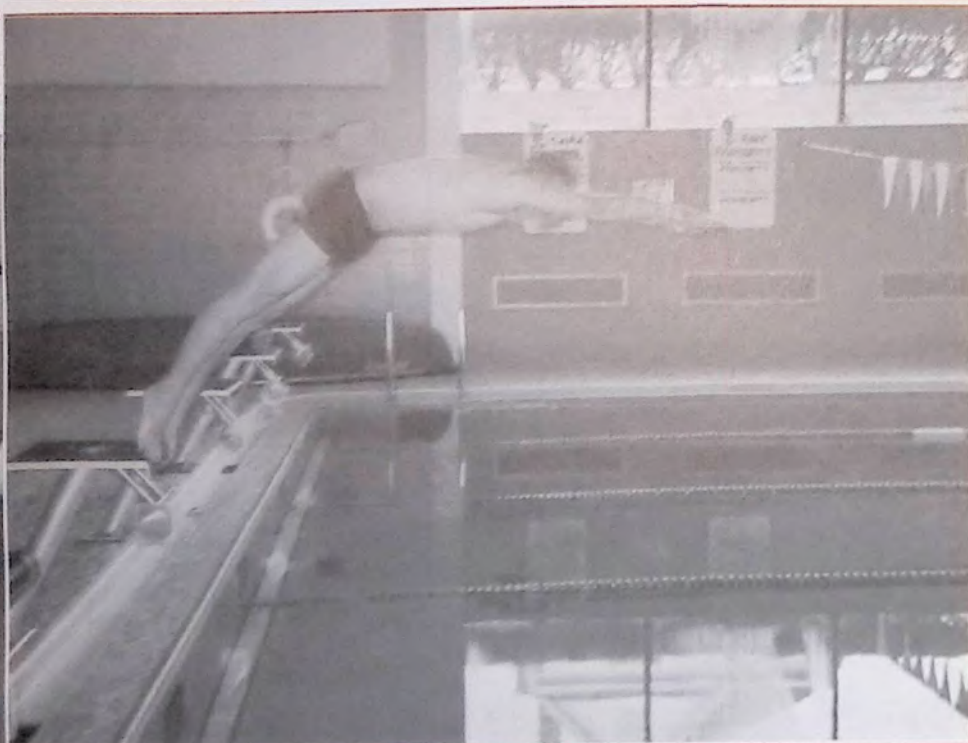

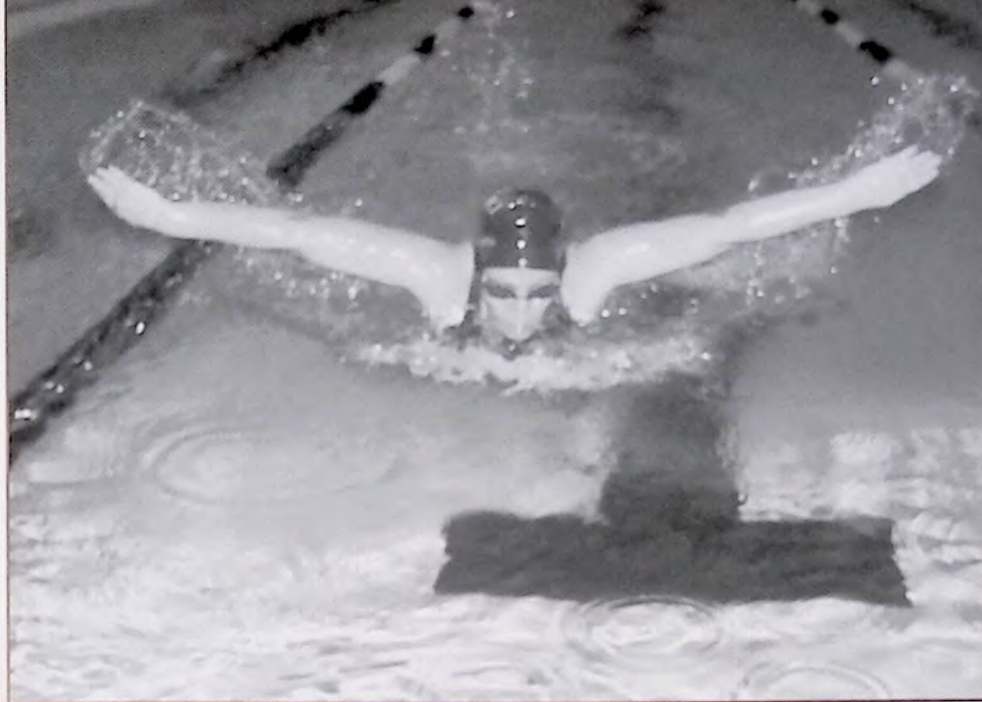

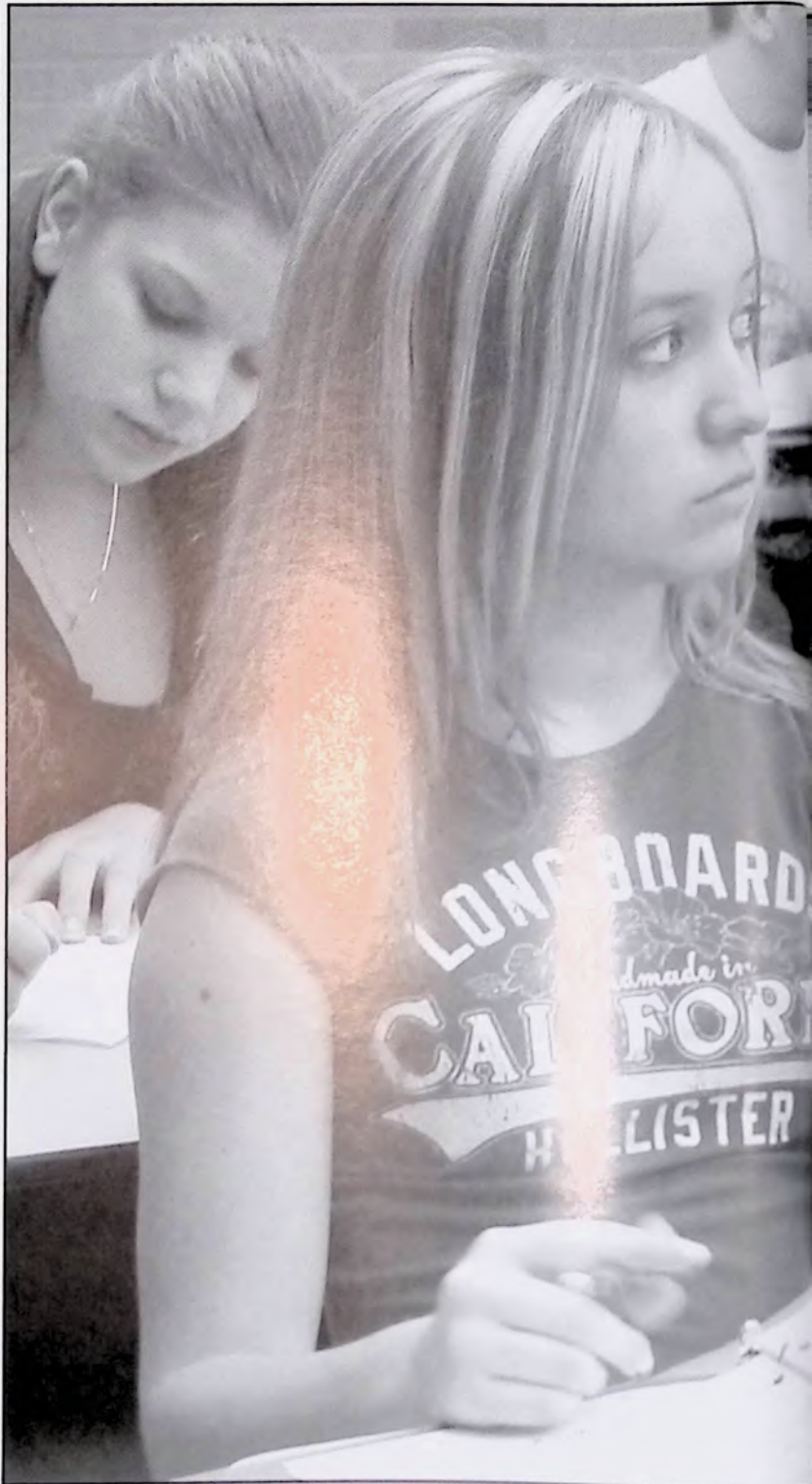

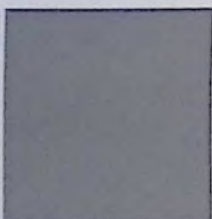

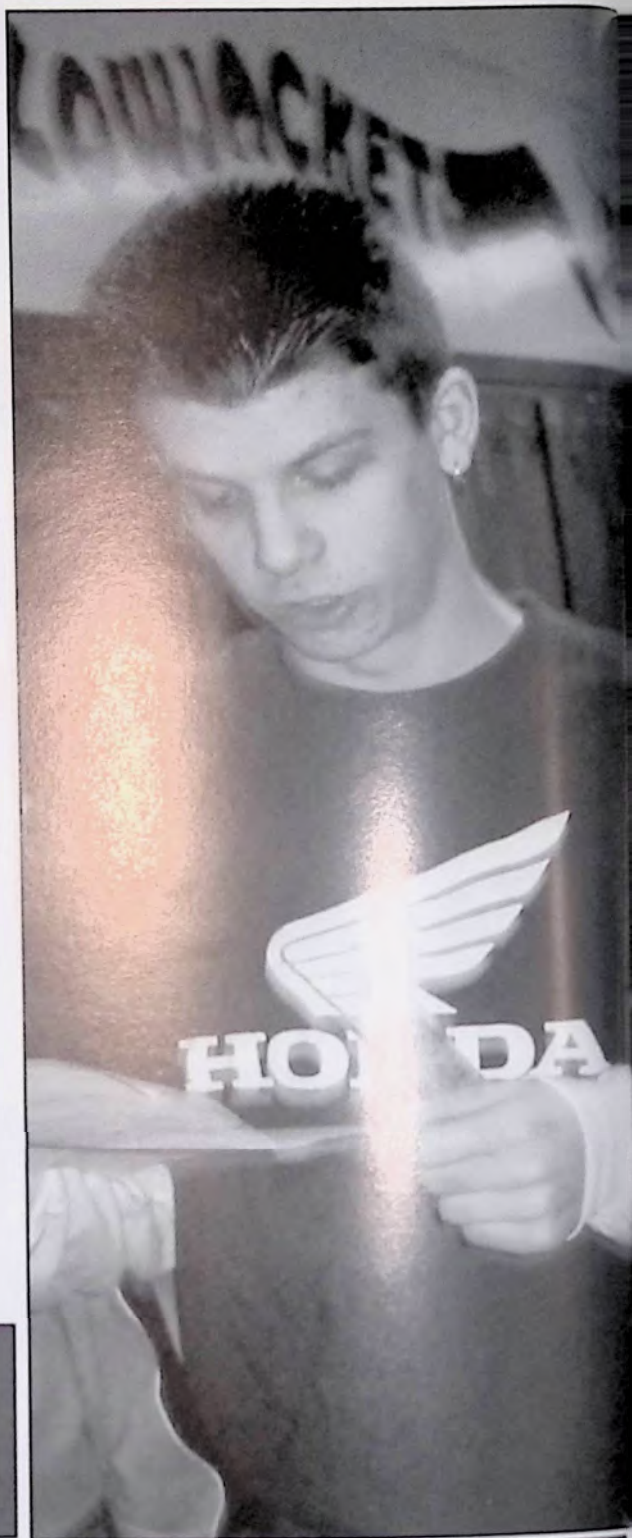
In this class, students may be concerned about their well-being and their levels of stress.

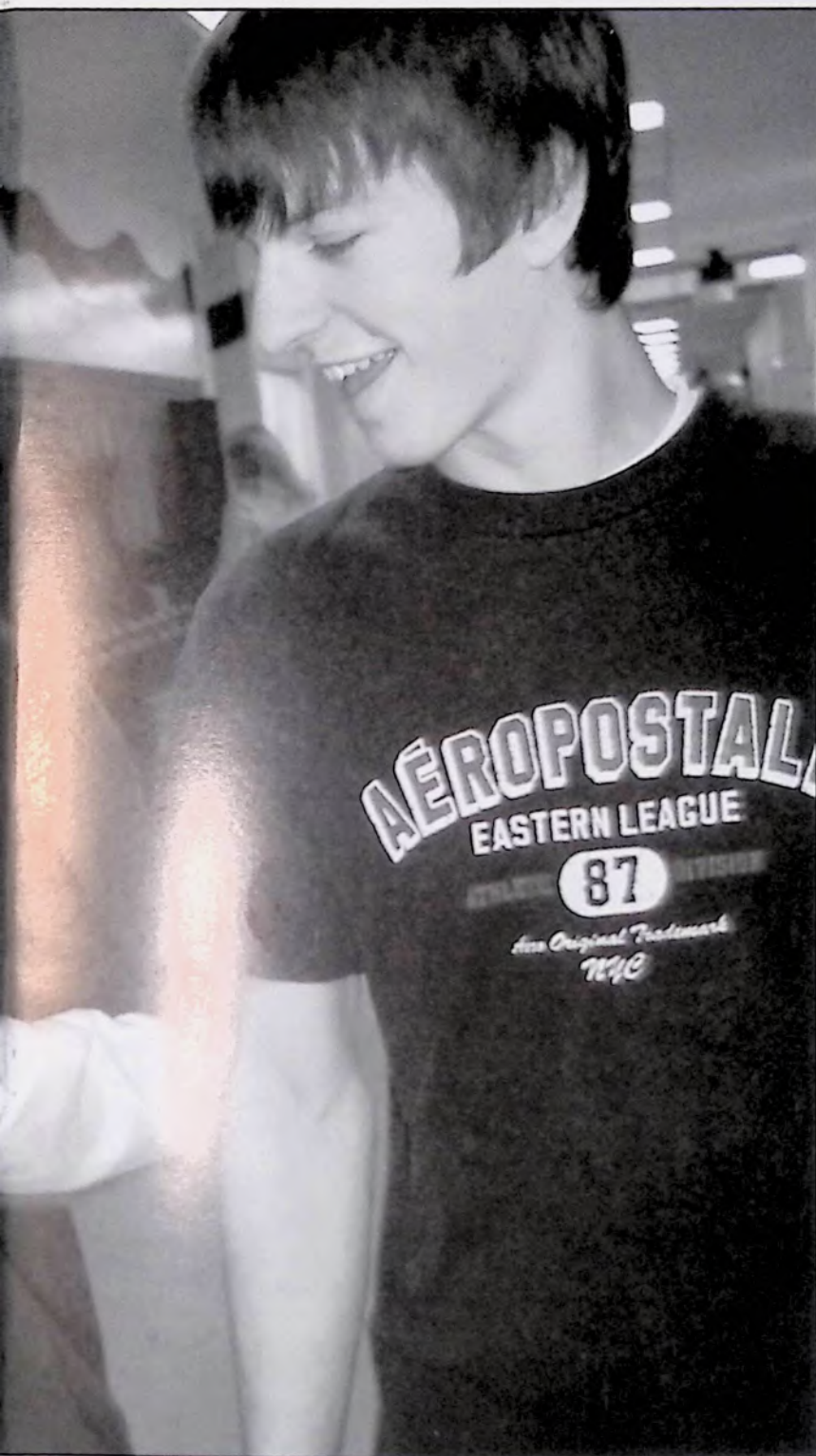

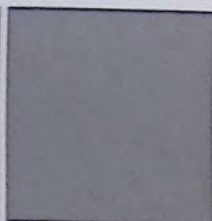

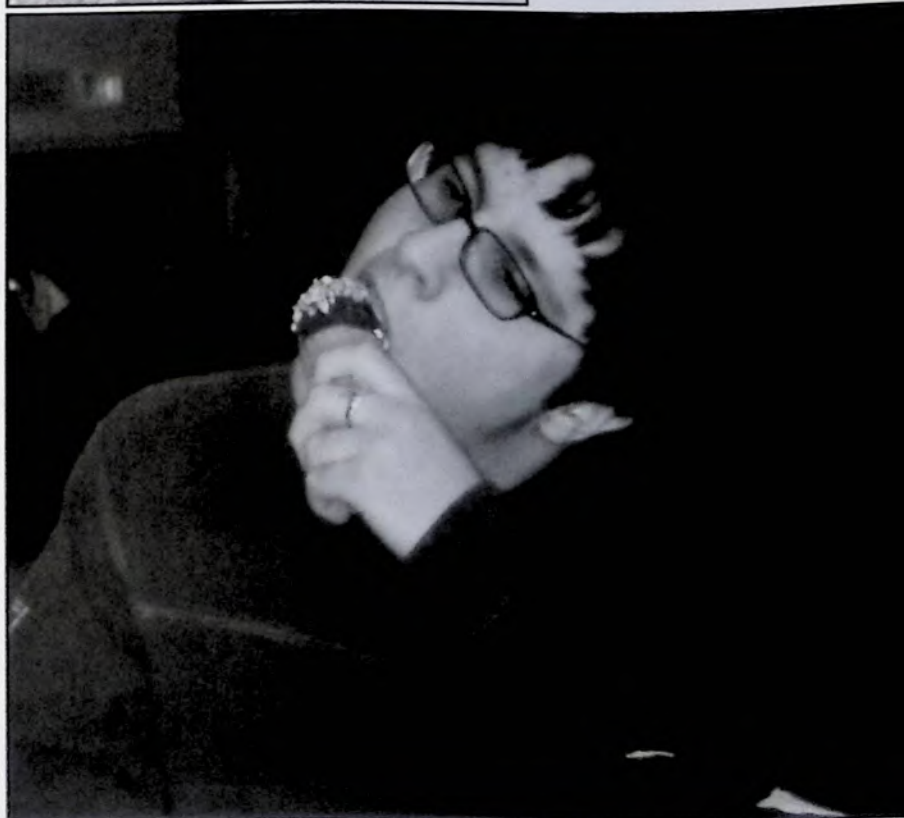

Government! Who can do without government? There's just something about learning about politics, China, American history, and Stalin that stimulates our minds and lets us venture out and get into a great debate.

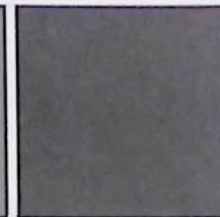
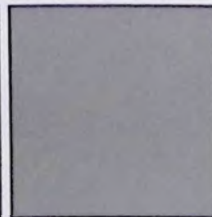
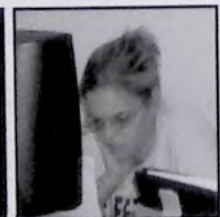
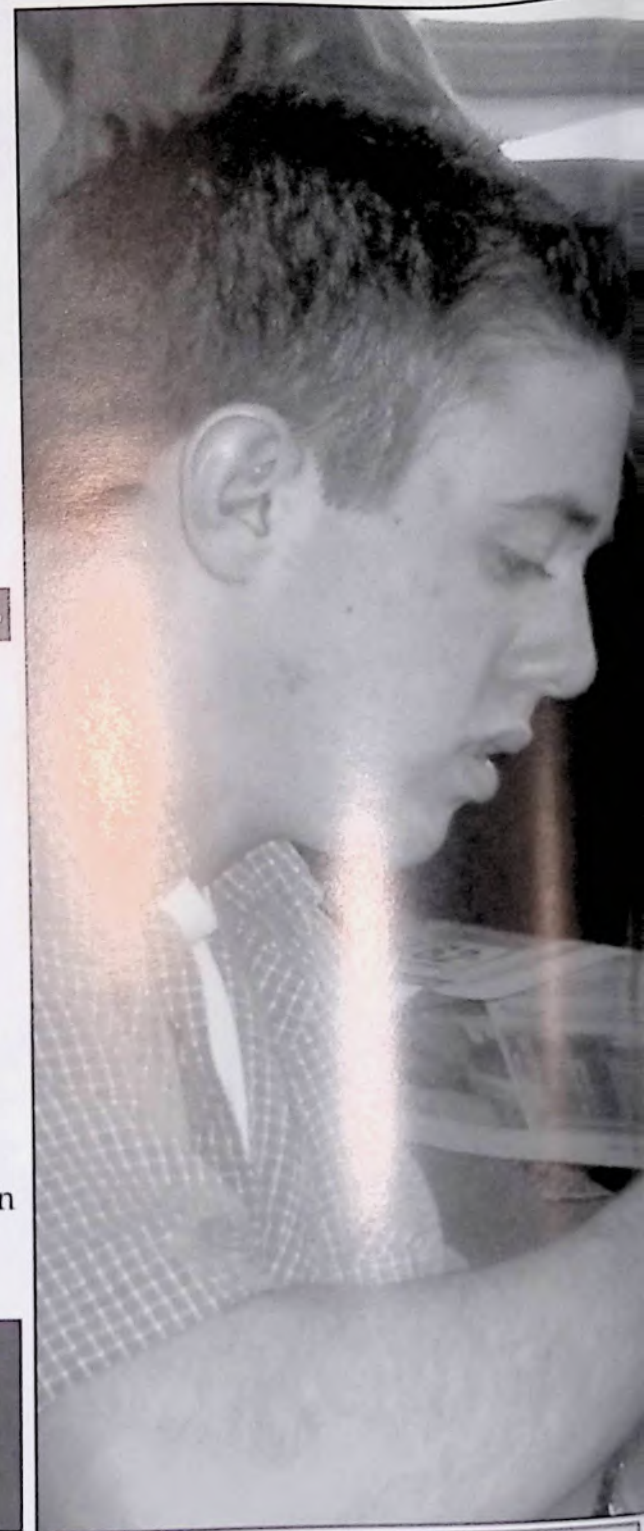

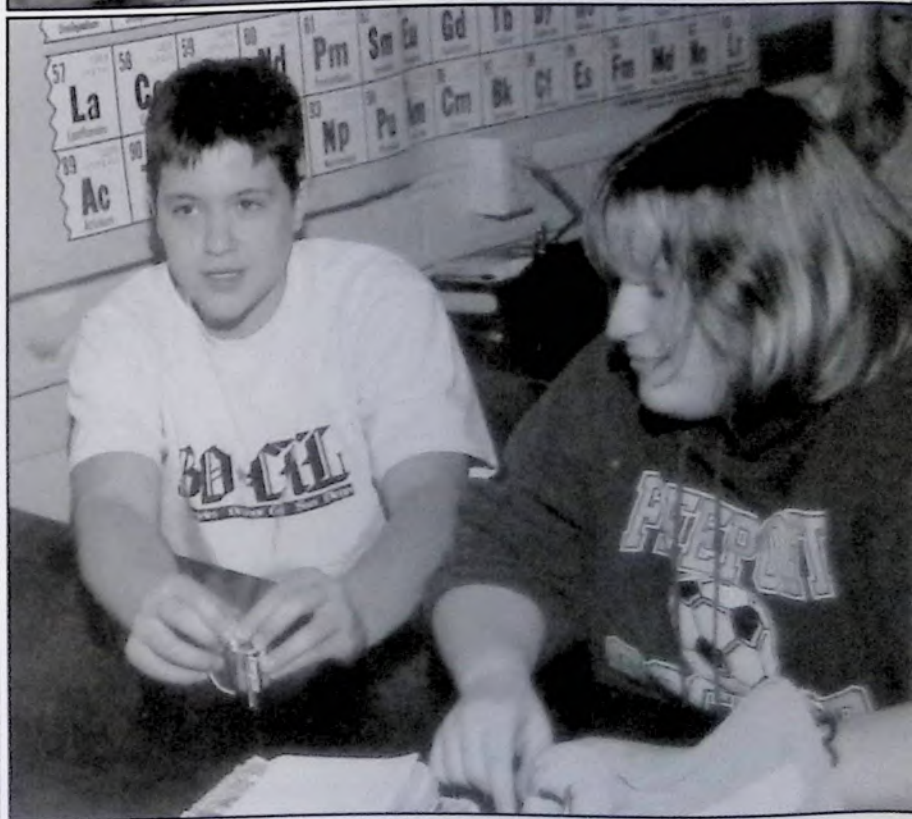

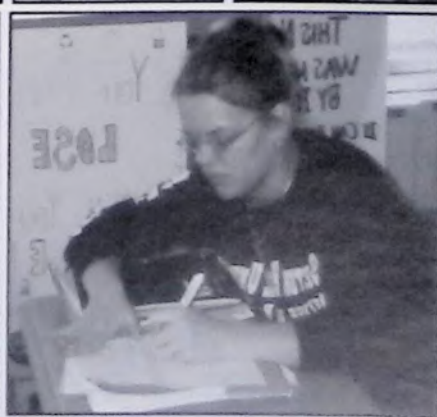
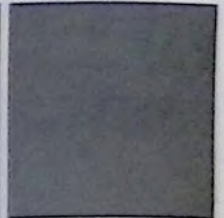
Many students use their study hall for doing other things, such as playing 'uncle worm' to get the high score or getting ready to run to their car so they can be near the front of the line.

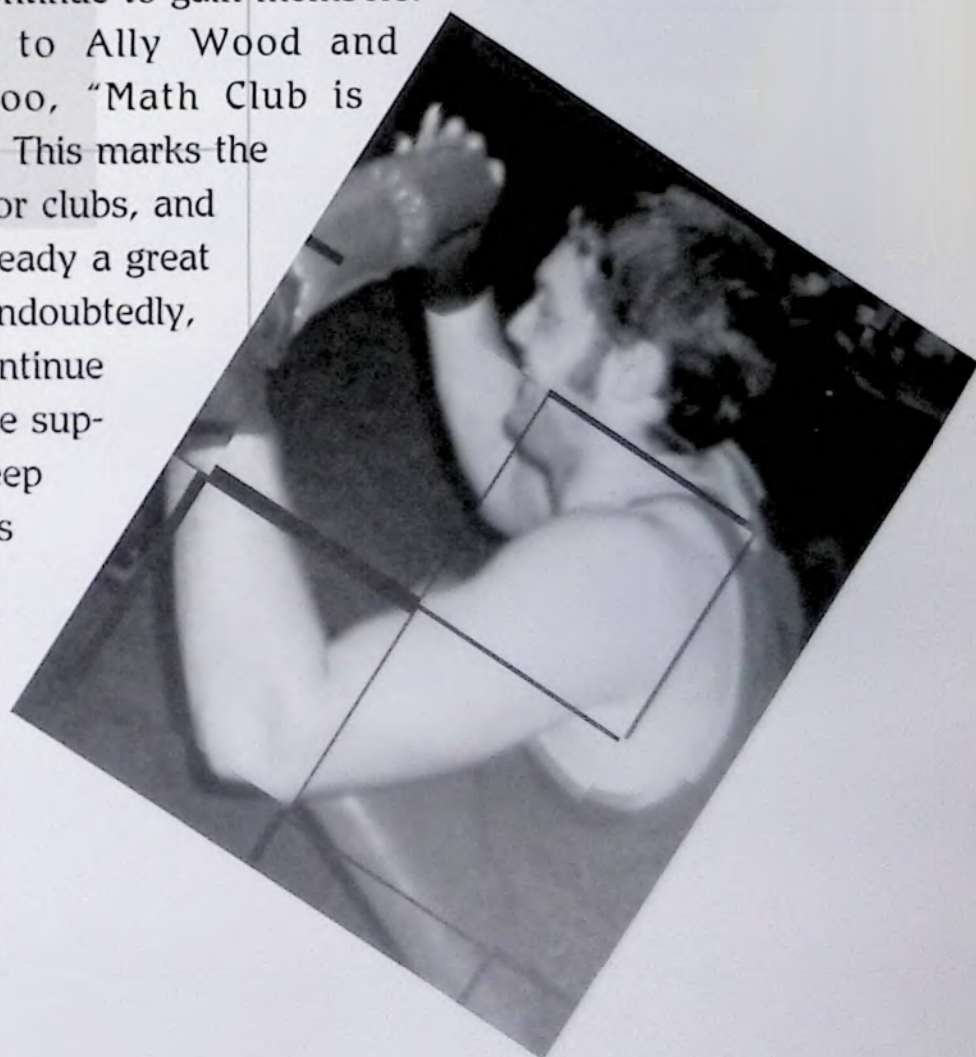

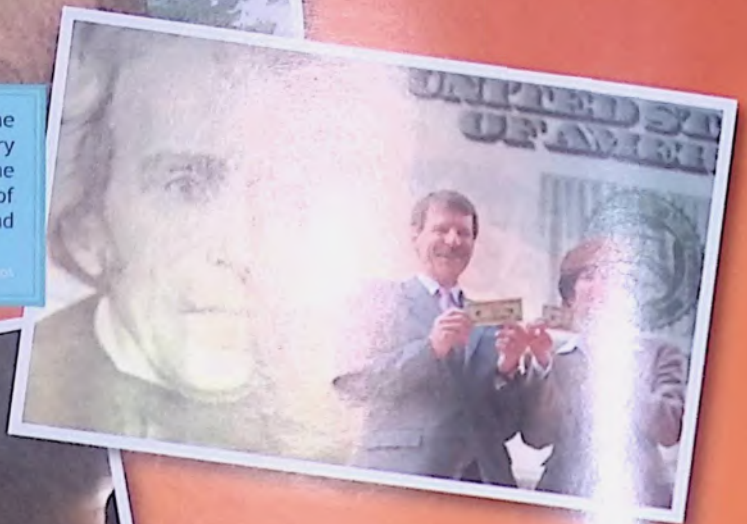

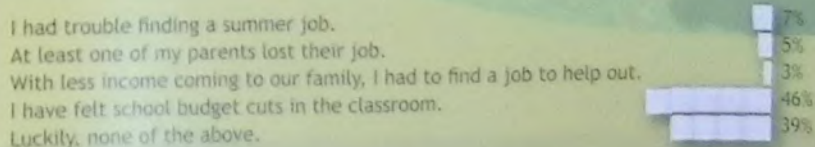

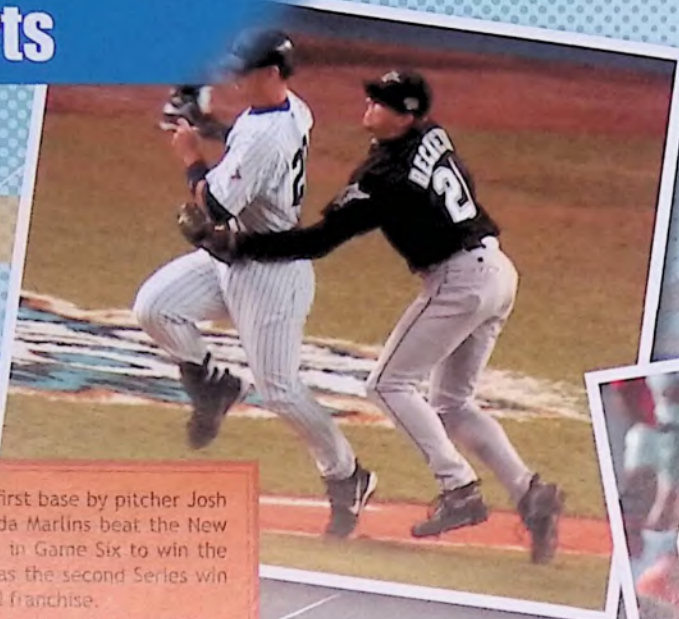


Has the weak U.S. economy affected you in one or more of the following ways?

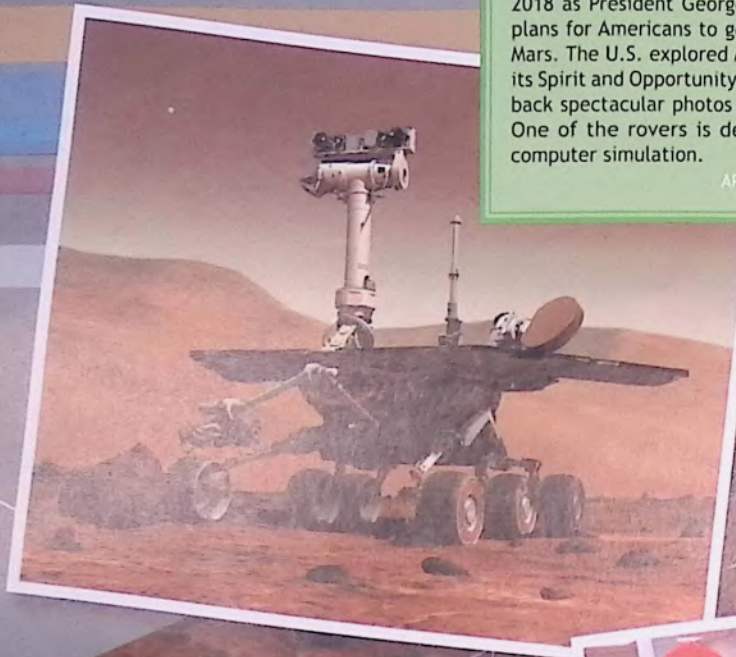

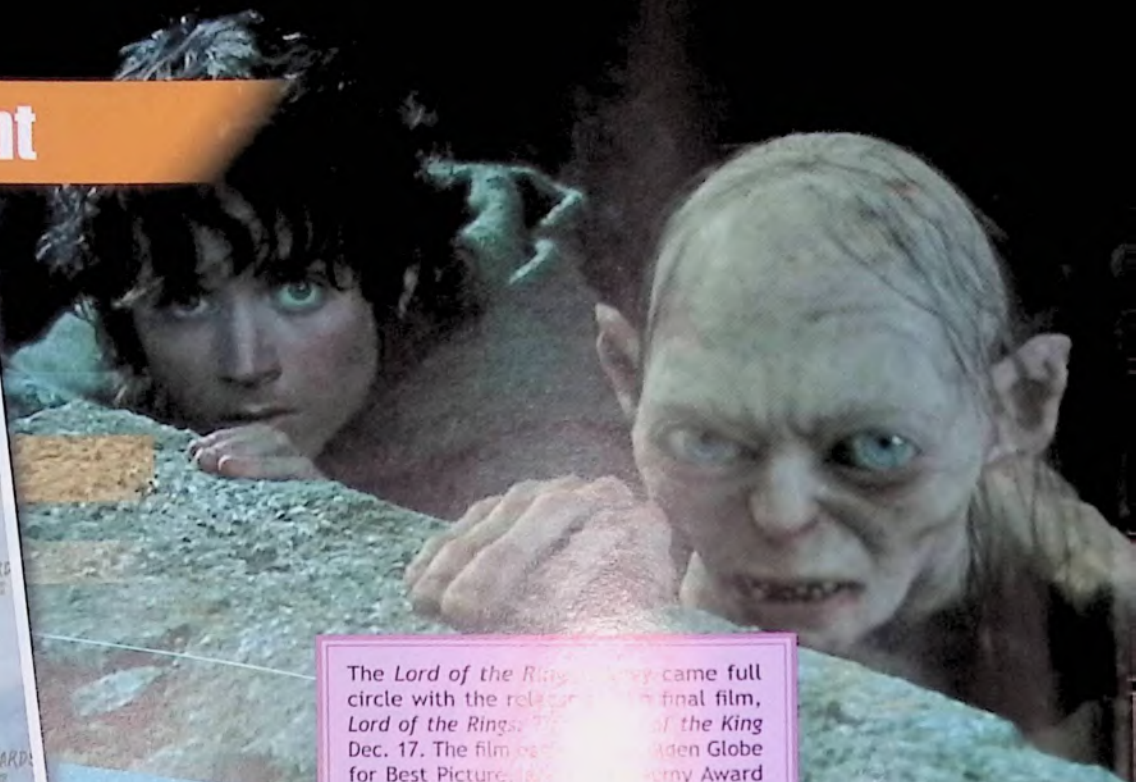

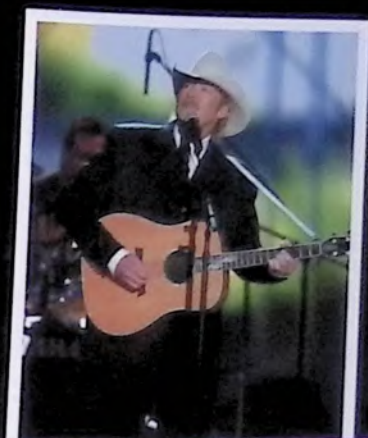

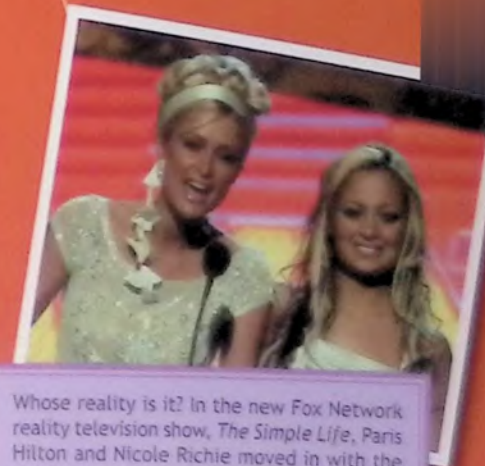
