
And then—Spring, the end of the year. Seniors nostalgically putting away books, the signing of year books, and the pomp and ceremony of graduation.

Besides selling candy and magazines, the juniors have put on two assemblies displaying the talents of fellow classmates. The assemblies were under the supervision of the home-room section teachers.


The Harvest Ball was an unforgettable success with our local band leader, Buddy Lee, and his Sextet.


COLLEGE CLUB

LIBRARY

Our Librarian, Miss Ewing, and her staff are always hard at work to satisfy all our needs. The library is open to all students seven periods of the day, providing they have a library permit. Students may receive the necessary permits from their subject teachers. Students and teachers have access to the library before and after school also. The library in Room 319 contains about 4,500 books, including reference works, supplementary texts, and recreational reading. The borrower is responsible for all books taken by him, and must pay for all those lost or damaged while charged to him. A fine of two cents per day is charged for each "two week" book kept after the date on which it is due, and five cents for each "over night" book. Besides being a very well-equipped library, the room contains a very interesting display of plant life.

BANK STAFF

Through the Student Bank come many business transactions. Students, teachers, section rooms, classes, and organizations are benefited by the bank. Mr. Vorlage, the cashier, selects the members when they are in their junior year. He chooses the members with recommendations from some of their teachers. 
KENTONIAN




Directors and Coaches






