Class History

On September 11, 1956, 50 of us stepped through the doorways of Allegheny Valley Hospital Nurses' Residence. With eager expressions on our faces and fear in our hearts, we stumbled over the load of suitcases and boxes up three flights of steps to the hideaway which was our living quarters for the months to come. Our first order for the day was a required attendance at an initiation party the following evening. Little did we realize that at this occasion, we would see our powdered noses become skinned as we pushed toilet tissue down the auditorium floor; a tornado would strike our newly arranged rooms; and in the middle of the night all of us were to be summoned by the seniors to report to the bathroom for "P Call."

"If you think I'm coming back Sunday, you're crazy," was the ever popular remark during the remainder of the week as we proceeded with our grueling orientation. We tried very hard to remember who was who and what was what. We walked to and from classes collecting books and supplies until at the end of the day all that could be seen of us were our eyes, peering over the mountain of material in front of us.

Our first big opportunity to practice our learnings came one day as we were scheduled for ward practice. Our knees became rubber and our nerves were on edge as we began our duties. This experience showed us truly why we had come into nursing.

After a most trying six months, the longest of our lives, we reached first base. On the wet, rainy evening of March 29, 1957, we received our caps. Many of our friends and relatives joined us at this happy event.

In May of the same year our class sponsored the "Stardust Ball," the traditional May Dance honoring our Senior Queen of the May, Kathy English. All of us looked our prettiest and danced to the music of an unforgettable orchestra and soloist.

Summer passed with those extra privileges and no classes. During this summer, the hospital began its building program.

In September of 1957, our second base was reached by obtaining our corner stripe which made us Junior students. During this year we split up into our special serves, starting with the Diet Kitchen and those luscious thick milkshakes and the Operating Room whose walls reverberated the exclamation, "Get those — hands off the Mayo!"

In October of 1957, sad farewells were passed as the first group of our class packed bags and left Allegheny Valley Hospital to go to Children's Hospital and Third Infants; then to Mayview and those fourteen weekends! The remainder of this year we spent keeping in touch with each other by writing from Children's, Mayview and Allegheny Valley Hospitals.

At 6:00 P.M., September 7, 1958, our third base was reached.

During the traditional "Blackbanding Ceremony" we received our long black velvet bands, making us proud Seniors. We could hardly eat anything from the buffet table due to our anxiety in receipt of our bands.

During the past three years, we have had many changes in our faculty. Miss Zetter and Miss Puett resigned in March of 1957. In the spring of 1957 we gained Mrs. Karrs and Mrs. Stetter to teach us medical-surgical nursing, Miss Anderson to direct our activities and Miss Hebeler to assist on the ward units. We proceeded at a status quo until the spring of 1959 when Mrs. Painter, Miss Rowe and Mrs. Steele resigned. During the last few months we have gained Mrs. Bissel and Miss Pompa.

Starting out with fifty, we have dwindled down to thirty-three plus the four we gained from the Class of 1958. As each of our classmates left for one reason or another, we shed a few tears and as time passes, we wonder where each is and what each is doing.

As we reminisce about people in our past, we think of our own TV hero, Mr. Huey, who spent much time flashing his light in parked autos and asking, "Are you going in here?" and checking doors of the Nurses' Residence to prevent the entrance of any unknown visitors. We shall always remember with pride our chosen Queen of the May, Melva Bailey who was crowned at the May Dance on May 15, 1959.

As accepted activities during our three years together we will never forget the Annual

Bazaars, the Hospital Christmas Parties, our summer picnics and many others.

Graduation for us will come in September. Our lives will channel in many directions, but in spirit we shall remain together as the Class of 1959.

We wish to express our sincere appreciation to Miss Anderson, our instructors, supervisors, graduate nurses, and all who helped us through these three years. A very special appreciation and thanks we wish to give to Mrs. Brownfield, our Class Sponsor.
