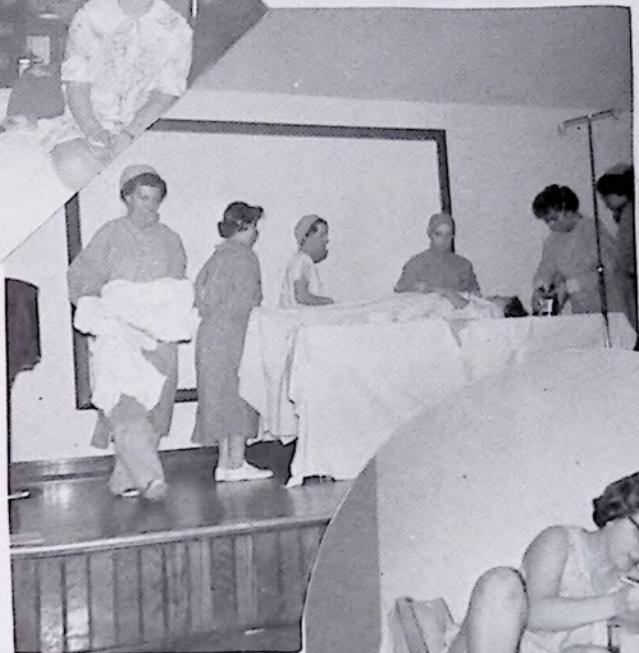
Student-Faculty Association

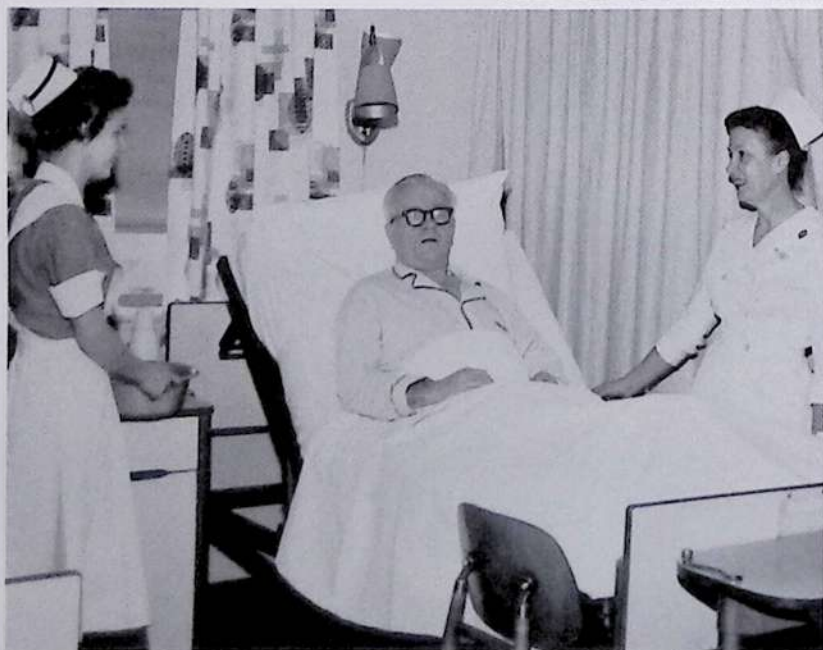

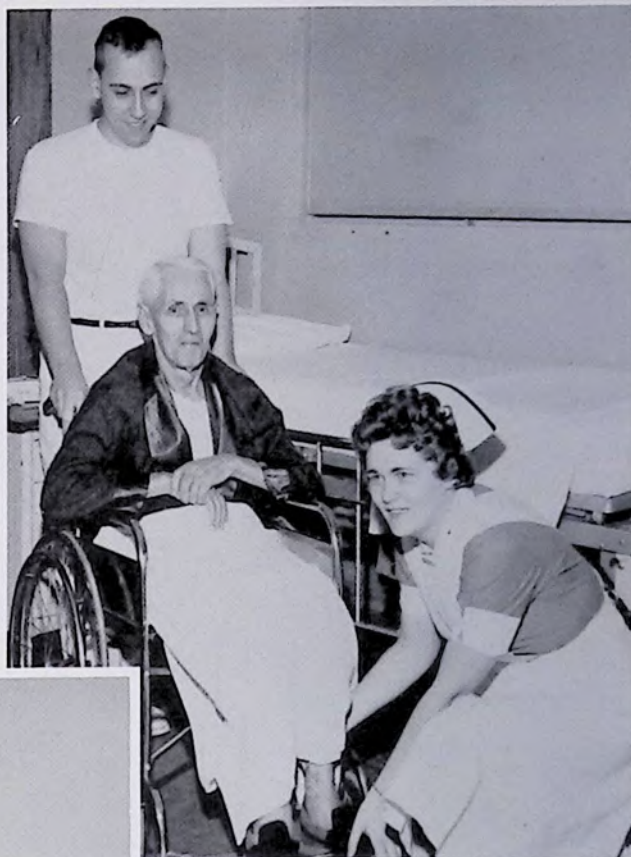
Back from her days off, this student is given a "helping hand" by one of her classmates. After a quick change she is ready for duty.

Food is the first item on today's schedule! In the cheerful dining area the students are served their meals cafeteria style. In this relaxing atmosphere merriment and laughter may be heard any hour of the day.

With the aid of our strong, good-natured orderlies we can assist our patients out of bed. This boosts his morale and leads to a "speedy" recovery.

Although the procedure for taking temperatures and pulses is considered a part of hospital routine, the nurse is constantly alert to any variation in her patient's vital signs.

Our Recovery Room experience is of great value to us because it provides us with an excellent opportunity to further develop our powers of critical observation.



Pediatrics is one of the most enjoyable areas of our nursing experiences. While on affiliation, at Children's Hospital, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, we are taught to give care to healthy as well as sick children.



While we are affiliating at Mayview State Hospital, Mayview, Pennsylvania, we acquire a basic understanding of the principles and methods used in the treatment and care of patients with mental disorders.



In the E.O.R. we learn to meet the needs of the emergency patient.

We welcome each patient warmly and attempt to make her feel our sincere interest in her and her family.

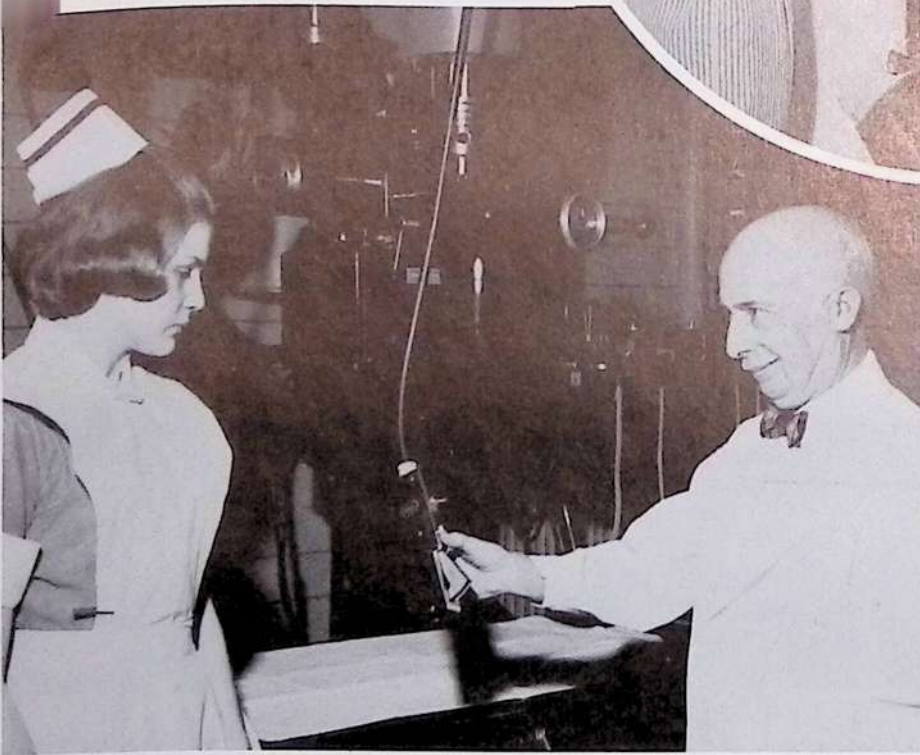


After a bath and a new hair style the newborn infant is taken to his mother for a "formal introduction."
