SENIOR CLASS HISTORY

It seems but a few months since we, as Freshmen, stepped across the threshold to enter East Deer High School. We were scared, green, yet proud to become a part of our young school's heritage. On that day in September of 1943, we took our places prepared to give our best to our alma Mater.

Our Freshmen year was not an easy one. The new surroundings; the more exacting study; and the fuller social life - all of these were bewildering at first. We can be thankful for our teachers' proddings that brought us through trying days in Math or Civics. The many activities that attracted our class members were: the band, the Hi-Lite, and many school dances. We were glad to be welcomed into these groups that are a vital part of a school and its student life.

In September of our Sophomore year we held the class elections. We chose our officers: Lawrence Ianni--President; Robert Stoneburner--Vice President; Virginia Nagy--Secretary; and John Figler--Treasurer. Miss Eakin served as class sponsor. Many of the boys earned places on the football and basketball squads. We felt honored when Arka Mae Bertolino was selected as one of the head majorettes while Evelyn Argo and Jeannette Prigon became cheerleaders. In March we held the Sophomore Hop. It was a very successful dance that was enjoyed by all. The entire class also participated in a Gym Exhibition sponsored by Miss O'Donnell and Mr. Heller. We held it in April after many weeks of intense practice and drill. We concluded the year with a very gay party. We had earned the money by selling T shirts.

Our class was smaller in its Junior year. In September we re-elected the same officers who had so ably served us in our Sophomore year. Mrs. McGeary was elected our sponsor. In December she resigned from the faculty. Mr. Petor replaced her as the class advisor. Our first formal dance, the Junior-Senior Prom was held at the Brackenridge Country Club on May 17th. It was a very gala affair. We raised money for the Class treasury by selling magazine subscriptions and by sponsoring a dance.

The fall of 1946 will be one our class members will long remember. We were Seniors now and at the height of our school life. We had class elections and again, the same officers were chosen. When our team won the Class B football championship of the W.P.I.A.L. we were very proud as the following Seniors had played a major part in winning the title: George Benes; John Figler, Henry Benecki, Andrew Crosky, Calvin Grossi, John Hyek, Lawrence Ianni, Jack McCaskey, Albert Mitro, Glenn Singleton, and Robert Stoneburner. Senior members of the basketball squad also had a very successful year by winning the Section 19 championship. They were: Andrew Crosky, Jack McCaskey, Richard Smith, Dale Spowls, and Robert Stoneburner. Senior girls elected to the May Queen Court were: Martha Belinotti, Arka Mae Bertolino, Dolores Crane, Olga Cupec, Betty Hoebeck, Virginia Nagy, Dolores Serventi, and Anna Marie Sevcik. We were also honored by being the first class to be invited to tour the Pittsburgh Plate Glass Company's plant.

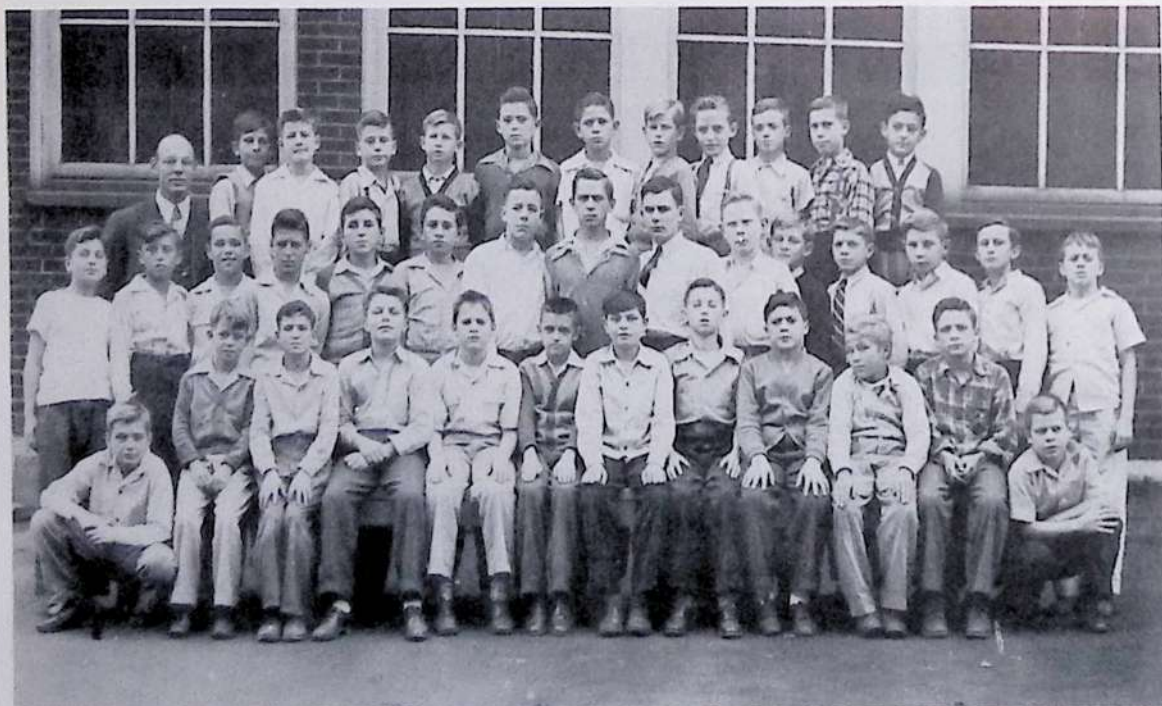

East Deer Clinches Championship

For the first time in the school's history East Deer Township High won the WPIAL Class B football championship on Saturday afternoon on the Etna High gridiron by defeating the Bethel High gridmen, 14-7, before some 3,000 chilled fans.

Calvin Grossi, the greatest little football player in the school's history, is the hero of the hour in the eyes of the East Deer High followers, who showed their appreciation by hoisting the mite halfback atop their shoulders immediately after the final whistle had blown and carried him to the dressing room.

Twice the mighty mite who scales around 145 pounds crossed the Bethel goal line to bring East Deer High the highly prized triumph which they so richly deserved.

Coach Al Rometo's charges have been knocking at the championship door for the past several years, but it was not until Saturday afternoon that the Bucks had finally attained their goal, that of winning the Class B WPIAL football honors.

East Deer High's title winning feat rounds out a perfect season for the Allegheny Valley scholastic grid followers, who proudly lay claim to the Class 'AA, A and B scholastic grid honors. New Kensington High is the proud possessor of the double A honors, Springdale High the Class A honors, and East Deer the Class B title.

The game Saturday afternoon proved to be a thriller, and the Bucks had to fight hard all the way before they managed to come out victorious over a stubborn Bethel combine which fought gamely to the very last before bowing to the East Deer eleven.

While Grossi gains the major share in the East Deer triumph, the remainder of the Buck's starting lineup must not be overlooked, for every boy who saw action gave his best to bring the crown to the cross-river school.

Jack McCaskey, husky fullback, Bob Stoneburner, who kicked both conversion points and directed the teams play flawlessly, and Henry Benecki, the other member in the Bucks' backfield, all did their share in the ball carrying department. It was the final game for four East

Deer backfield performers and proved to be a fitting climax to their scholastic careers.

Lawrence Ianni, Lido, Andy Crosky, John Hyek and Bob Molnar, were the standout linemen for the newly crowned Class B champions.

Grossi's Touchdowns

The Bucks' first score came in the late stages of the first quarter, when Grossi, on reverse from Henry Benecki, scotted 18 yards to score in the right hand corner of the end zone. Stoneburner converted with a perfect place kick while Benecki held the leather.

Bognar gained a yard to left tackle. Jack Sourbeer went off left tackle for a Bethel touchdown. Pete St. Clair plunged through left tackle for the conversion point.

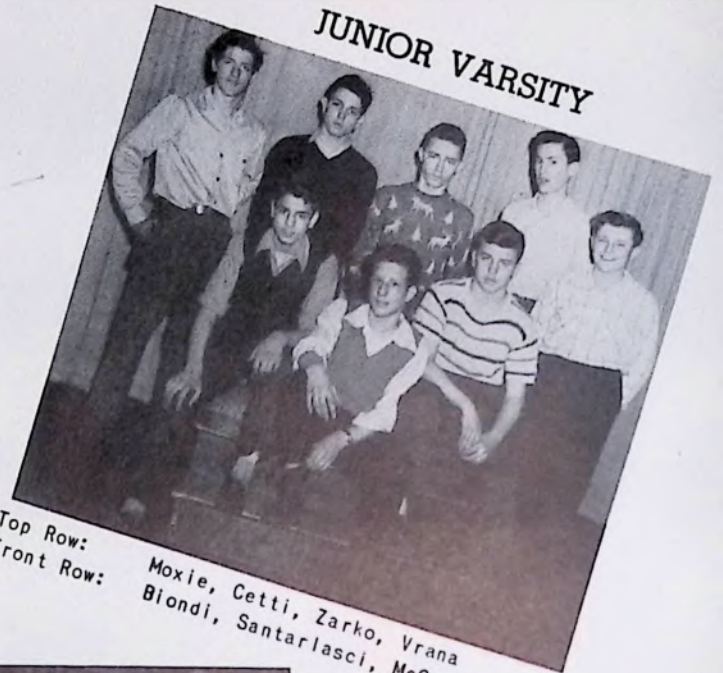
