SCIENCE CLUB

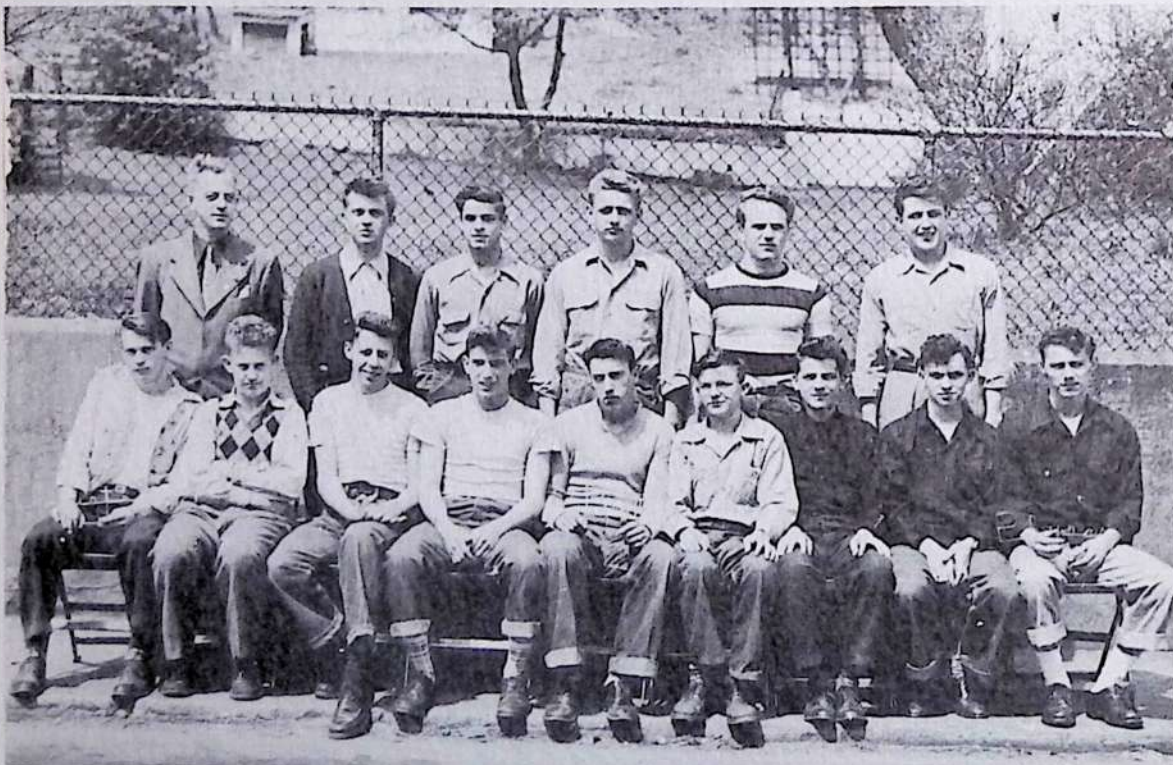
